

Statue Of Liberty To Get Cleaning

WASHINGTON, May 27 (AP)—The Statue of Liberty is due for a half-million dollar beauty treatment.

The house appropriations committee recommended that amount today to "clean up" Bedloe's island in New York harbor on which the statue is located and to install a heating plant in the statue for the comfort of winter visitors.

The Statue of Liberty improvement is included in a \$13,000,684 budget recommended for the national park service for the 12 months beginning July 1. The total is \$2,372,629 more than the appropriation for this year, but \$2,893,466 less than the budget request.

The committee allowed \$3,658,163 for the maintenance and improvement of the 26 national parks, \$1,541,464 for the national monuments and \$273,495 for recreational areas under park service jurisdiction.

A total of \$1,952,350 is allotted for physical improvements, including \$60,000 for more housing for visitors at Olympic national park in Washington and \$25,000 for the reconstruction of a retaining wall and park area at the Oregon Caves national monument.

A breakdown of the funds approved for the national parks includes:

Crater Lake, Ore., \$123,524; Mount McKinley, Alaska, \$51,865; Mount Rainier, Wash., \$177,822; and Olympic, Wash., \$101,919.

Paul Griffith, past national Legion commander, made the statement before the senate judiciary committee. He asked speedy senate approval of the house-passed Mundt-Nixon bill to curb communists.

"We have today in our midst the largest fifth column of potential spies, saboteurs, demoralizers, traitors, and wreckers ever seen in modern times," Griffith said.

He said the 100,000 "Quislings are aided and protected" by an "estimated million or more fellow travelers, sympathizers and dupes." Griffith testified the communist party is "collecting a war chest of \$500,000 in an attempt to defeat the Mundt-Nixon bill."

"Every fellow traveler, stooge and

deluded dupe has been thrown into the line," he said.

As the three-day hearing opened, Chairman Wiley (R-Wisc.) ruled out "any political speeches"—by Henry Wallace or anybody else. Wallace, third party presidential candidate, had asked to testify against the measure.

400 NAMES NEEDED ON WHITE PETITION

SALEM, May 27 (AP)—Sponsors of the move to take over Camp White hospital as a state hospital still need 300 more signatures to put their initiative measure on the ballot.

David O'Hara, chief of the state elections division, said today he has finished checking the signatures and found they were 300 short of the required 18,900 names. The sponsors have until July 1 to get the rest.

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
