

# Motschenbacher, Dorris, Weitkamp, Rose Of Tule Up For Freeholder Posts

TULELAKE, May 28 — Names of three men from this northeastern part of Siskiyou county, two from Tulelake and one from Dorris, will appear as candidates for freeholders in the June 1 primary election. Twenty one names will appear on the ballots and 15 are to be elected. Registered locally are W. H. Weitkamp and Ivan Rose, Tulelake, both well known ranchers, and

Clarence E. Motschenbacher, Dorris, justice of the peace and motel operator.

The 15 winning candidates are potential writers of the proposed charter for the charter form of government that will be on the November election ballot if the voters give the freeholder candidates the go sign next Tuesday.

The charter, a document designed to eventually reduce county taxes, eliminate alleged waste and extravagance and place the county on a better business basis will also provide for more equitable representation between the urban and rural areas.

Local voters approved the plan for the charter government a year ago but the issue was defeated in other parts of the county. Names other than the three local men appearing on campaign literature being circulated here which are endorsed by the charter good government committee are Dr. Eugene V. Anderson, Don V. Bank, William A. Barr, Frank M. Duggan, William J. Evans, Harold Kane, Dr. Francis W. Martin, John Mazzini, John D. Morgan, Aaron Ivan Rose, L. D. Babe Taylor, Carl F. Tuttle Sr., and Frank L. Weamer.

Others entering the race are Leon M. Allen, Fred P. Browne, George E. Luttrell, Wayne O. Ralston, Robert B. Reynolds and Charles W. Thompson.

L. D. Babe Taylor is county chairman.

Don Potter is chairman of the local committee favoring the charter and other committee members are P. C. Bergman, Clark W. Fenster, Tom Kadous, L. C. Kirby, Charles K. Wiese, Earl Ager, W. H. Anderson, Ivan Rose and W. H. Weitkamp.

The present board of supervisors, Sem Davidson, Scotts Valley; Gordon Jacobs, Montague; Fred Burton, Yreka; Fred Wolford, Etna and W. Douglas, Mt. Shasta have filed for re-election.

PORTLAND, May 28 (AP)—Portlanders are still taking money from their savings accounts to pay current expenses, and not putting as much back into the bank. The Federal Reserve bank today reported a new drop in Portland savings accounts. The May 19 total of \$215,000,000 fell \$1,000,000 below the previous week and \$7,000,000 below a year ago.

Real estate loans increased to \$27,000,000, about \$5,000,000 more than a year ago.
