Deepest sympathy is extended to the family of Jack Holzhauser, who died last Wednesday evening. He is

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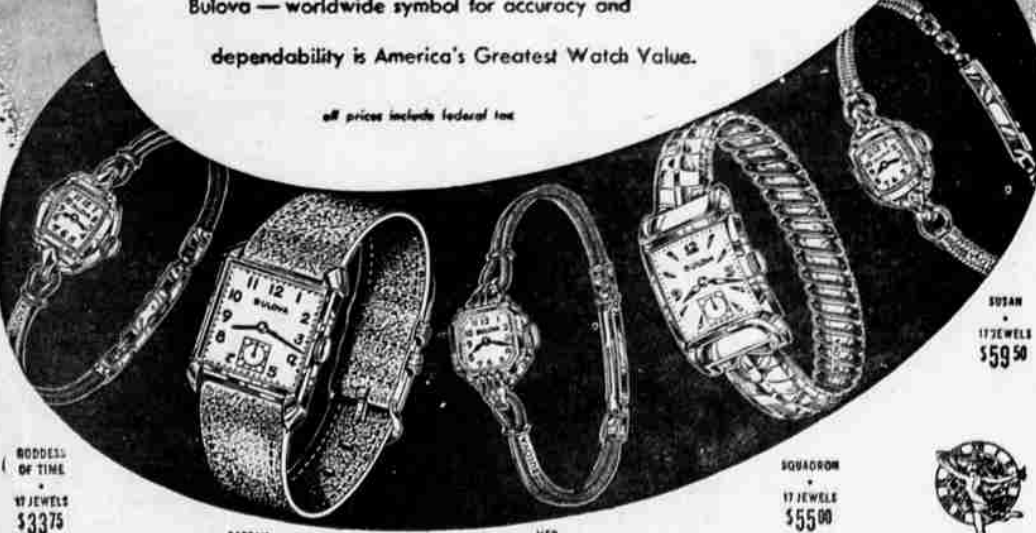
