

Stassen Had Top Vote In 20 Counties

Harold Stassen led in 20 counties to 16 for Governor Tom Dewey of New York in their presidential preference battle among republicans in the primary election, but the Minnesotan trailed in the final state overall count by about 10,000 votes.

This is shown in a county table on presidential preference vote prepared by the Associated Press at the request of The Herald and News. Only six precincts out of the state's 3661 were missing when the tabulation was made.

Klamath was on Dewey's side when the final count was in, but Lake county slipped over to Stassen by a few votes. Jackson lined up with Dewey but Deschutes gave Stassen a narrow lead. In most counties where Stassen was ahead, it was by thin margins. Just two votes separated the GOP hopefuls in Linn county, of which Albany is county seat.

In reading the following table, it should be kept in mind that Truman was unopposed on the democratic ticket. Because of "no contest" there, votes from two counties on democratic president have not yet been counted.

Demonstration on making a lamp from the room improvement class was given by Frances McMillan and Carol Ellingson.

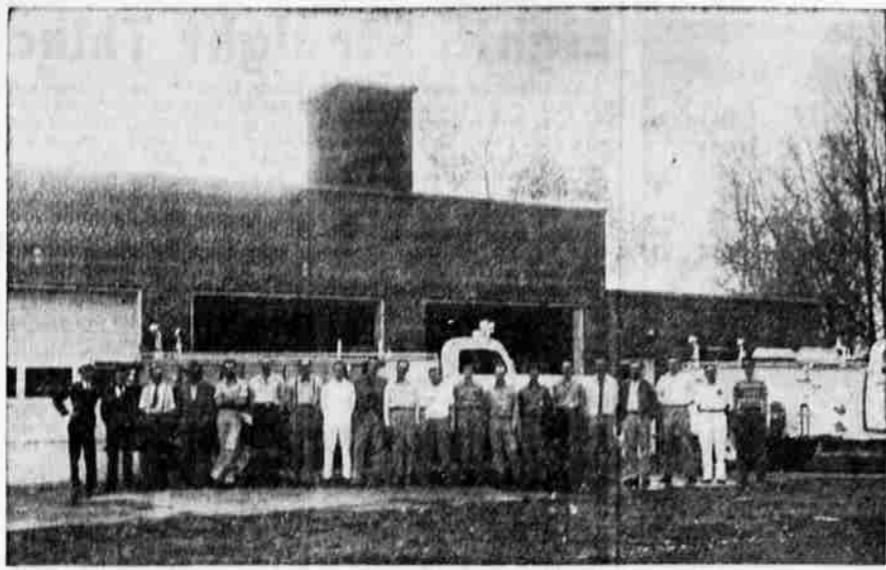
During the style review given by girls' sewing classes two and three, Barbara Campbell played a piano solo.

Rogue River Plans Opposed

PORTLAND, May 28 (AP)—Petitions opposing development of the Rogue river basin were in circulation here today.

The Multnomah Anglers and Hunters club were circulating them here, and the Isaak Walton league said its update chapters also would circulate them.

They oppose the bureau of reclamation's plan for developing the basin on the ground one of the west's best steelhead and salmon streams would be ruined for sportsmen.

The petitions are to be presented at a public hearing called by the bureau at Medford, June 8. Under discussion at the meeting will be alternate plans for basin development.

One would call for construction of 16 dams in the Rogue and its tributaries. The other proposes 17 dams. A supplemental program suggests seven dams in the lower Rogue and Illinois river.
