

Willows Nips Gems In Slugging Match

Shortstop Muti Hurt By Liner In Sixth

WILLOWS, Calif., May 29.—(Special)—The Willows Cards outclubbed the Klamath Falls Gems in their first meeting of the Far West Baseball league season here last night, winning 16 to 11 in a marathon game that saw the Gems use three hurlers and the Redbirds four. Joe Nicholas, starting pitcher for the Gems, didn't help his own cause any by issuing nine bases on balls and was the loser.

The Gems' inner defense received a setback halfway through the game when a line drive off the bat of Jim Tyack struck Nick Muti, shortstop, on the instep. Muti was carried off the field and moved to a Willows hospital.

The injury forced some shifting in the Klamath Falls lineup, with Hal Taylor going over from third base to short and Joe Anselmo coming in from right field to take third.

Joe Carroll, a Klamath Falls hometown boy now pitching for the Cards on option from Fresno, started for Willows but was relieved in the fourth by John Yocum, who got credit for the win.

The Gems built up an early lead with a three-run burst in the fourth but couldn't hold it. The Cards went ahead in the fifth and shelled Nicholas from the mound with a six-run spurge in the sixth. Lou Vitous put out that fire but couldn't handle one of his own making in the seventh when he was relieved by Forrest Schoettgen.

Lee Singleton homered for the Cards with one on in the fifth and Dick Morgan duplicated with one on in the seventh.

The two teams play here again tonight and again Sunday.

Olympic Shell Boys Wait Next Big Test

SEATTLE, May 29 (AP)—Washington, holdover Olympic crew champion, gets its second test of the season today against a potent Wisconsin eight which has lost only to unbeaten Cornell in three starts this year.

Judging from the way Al Ubrichson's University of Washington crew trimmed California a week ago, we have something of a contract on our hands," said Wisconsin Coach Norm Scott.

He'll send his varsity and jayve boys against the Ubrichson oarsmen this afternoon in a pair of two-mile tests. Only once in the several dual meetings between the schools has Wisconsin taken a race. The Washington mentor has warned his gallery drivers to forget the record and their three-mile victories over California.

Gems Whack Off Two, Couple May Go This Sunday

Gene Bonner, outfielder, and Don Carline, reserve catcher, have been released by the Klamath Falls Gems in Manager Joe Gantenbein's first move toward getting down to the legal class D roster limit of 17 players and a couple more heads probably will roll this week-end.

Deadline for the roster cut in the Far West league is May 30, Sunday. Business Manager Mel Carpenter said that he was expecting to get a couple more boys in, an infielder and a left-handed pitcher, in time to beat the deadline.

Right now the Gems are carrying 18 players—seven pitchers, two catchers, four outfielders and five infielders. When two more are added, three must go.

Several of the boys are on the borderline, including pitcher Forrest Schoettgen, Catcher Dick Descalzo, Outfielder Irv Whitt, Infielder Hal Taylor and Catcher Ralph Mohler. The latter was hurt Thursday night at Santa Rosa.

AILING FLIPPER

Joe Nicholas has been unable to carry his share of pitching duty because of an ailing arm and is also on the anxious seat.

The Gems are at Willows, guests of the Cards, but will be home Monday for a three-game series with the Marysville Braves. A two-night doubleheader is on the schedule for Monday, Memorial Day holiday.

First game will start at 5 p. m. and the second at 7:45, out at Gems stadium.

Official batting average for the Gems, figured through Thursday night's game with Santa Rosa and including all 23 complete games played at that time plus the season's opener 6-5 tie with Oreville show that Joe Gantenbein is the club's leading and heaviest hitter among the club's regulars. Gantenbein has played in 12 games and batted .398. He has hit three home runs, all at Gems stadium.

Tom Mankey has played in every game and swatted for .347. Mankey has nine doubles, two triples and one homer. Joe Anselmo, who hits clean-up position, is batting .321 and has collected seven doubles, two triples and one home run. Little Bob Wallace, who has now been hitting up a storm since he took a regular berth at second base and now has an average of .342.

On the pitching side Larry Guelfo and Art Moyer each have three wins and a single loss. Bob Blengino one win and no losses. Lou Vitous one and one. Joe Nicholas two and one. Forrest Schoettgen one and two and Bob Loepman, workhorse of the outfit, two wins and four losses.

Lopeman has appeared in eight games. Moyer has 44 strikeouts in six games.

Volk inflicted a slight cut over Duke's left eye in the seventh and got in the best blow of the fight in the same round when he staggered his foe with a terrific right to the side of the head.

Duke, the favorite, weighed 161 and Volk scaled 161 1/2. A crowd estimated at 4500 witnessed the card.

DRAFT JUMP JAILS JEFFRA

BALTIMORE, May 29 (AP)—Harry Jeffra, one-time holder of two world's boxing titles, and Baltimore fight promoter Nathan E. Phillips were sentenced to six months' imprisonment each in federal court yesterday for violating the wartime draft act.

Mishaps Mar Cinderpath As USC, Handily Wins Conference Title

LOS ANGELES, May 29 (AP)—It was on to further trials along the trail toward the Olympic games today for the Trojans of Southern California, champions of the Pacific Coast conference, after a track and field meet that brought more disappointments than thrills.

For the second week in a row, mishaps marred a major cinder path carnival last night. They were included: Speedy performances by Pel-Mel Patton of USC in the dashes didn't come off because Patton came up with a cramped leg muscle.

A similar mishap to Washington State's Dick Keniston in the sprints, which robbed the Cougars of possible victory later in the mile relay. The Trojans copped the coast conference title for the eighth straight year. The night's top honors went to hurdler Craig Dixon, of UCLA, who cracked two of the three meet records broken in winning the low and high sticks.

Knox Tops Belcastro In Armory Main Tiff

Bellin' Buddy Knox foiled Pete Belcastro in an attempt to nick his local winning streak in last night's armory main event, and disabled him to boot, virtually crippling the Weed Assassin with a prolonged series of back-breakers.

Pete had taken the first fall in the initial round, bashing the Pennsylvania villain all over the ring and then slamming him down for the count, and had trustingly turned his back and retired to his corner. When Knox failed to get sympathy from either the crowd or Referee Mill Olson, he rushed over to the Assassin's corner and sent a rabbit-punch crashing down on the unsuspecting Belcastro's neck just as the warning whistle for the second round was sounded.

Belcastro never did recover from the untimely blow, and was easy pickings for Knox, who proceeded to mangle him with his infamous back-breaker. When the Pennsylvania villain finally decided to let the referee count out Belcastro, that worthy was helpless and very, very sore, but was still breathing out threatnings of things to come.

Knox encountered little of his usual difficulty in returning to the dressing rooms, making his grand recessional amidst police protection. In the semi-windup of the card, Martino Angelo chose the Boston crab with which to make his return to the local grunt and groan, taking two falls and the match from Al Szaaz.

Angelo gained his first fall in the first round, but Szaaz came back in the next go and took a fall with a leg-split. Szaaz was still unable to cope with the dark skinned ring

rogue, and dropped the match in the third canto when Angelo whipped him into the crab. Billy Hunter and Milt Olson, the latter making a return after a lengthy absence from the local canvas, battled to a draw in the opening bout with one fall apiece. Hunter drew first blood in the third round with a bear hug, but Olson sneaked in a drop kick and pinned Hunter, still stunned, in the fourth and final canto.

Patton was included, and several others were included as alternates, pending their performances in the NCAA meet June 18. These were Keniston, sprints; George Raamussen, Oregon, pole vault; Bob Laidlaw, Oregon State, broad jump. The latter is the northern division champ, with a 24 foot 2 inch jump made this year, but had a bad night and failed to place here.
