The Photographic History scene shifts today to the old Dorris ranch near Dorris, one of the big early-day cattle operations of this region.

Here is a typical ranch situation back in 1890, showing the D ranch wranglers gathered around, and bearded Pres Dorris himself (left) sitting in his light buckboard, watching the operation.

There's a pile of grub-baskets in the center of the picture, and there also stands Lew Allen, the blacksmith, ready to shoe the black horse.

Men shown in the picture include Pres Dorris, Rube White, Lew Allen, John O'Shaughnessy, Bill Skeen, Pressley Dorris (nephew), Superintendent J. J. Shaw, Cow Boss Henry Picard, Dave Skeen, Jack Snyder (in wagon), Milt Richardson (with four-horse team in background) and Henry Shaw, (with the four-horse team in background right).

All of the men shown in the picture are now deceased except the two Skeens. Old-timers will remember many of them, and some gave their names to geographical locations in this area.

camp and Friday arrangements will be completed for seasonal personnel to be taken to the fire guard training school on June 9.

WARRENTON, Ore., May 29 (AP)—The mystery of the missing fishing boat, Rose Ann, still was unsolved today.

The drag boat Jack Jr. came back to port after reporting a "heavy object" had snagged in her drag net. The net towed the heavy object some distance, finally brought up two cabinet drawers.

A former Rose Ann crewman inspected the drawers, but could not identify them as belonging to the ship, which disappeared in a February storm, with four men aboard.

It has not been determined whether divers will be sent down.

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Bids Called On Lost River Channel Work

A call for bids on the enlargement of the Lost river diversion channel, the largest job the U. S. bureau of reclamation has had in this area in years has been announced by USBR officials.

Bids on the project are being invited and will be opened in the USBR office, Klamath Falls, at 10 a. m. on June 30, 1948.

Work involves enlargement of the channel from the Lost river diversion dam at Henley to the vicinity of Texum on the Southern Pacific railroad just south of the stockyards and east of the bridge on the main highway to Weed, Calif.

Largest item of the project is the million cubic yards of excavation called for in widening the channel. Rebuilding and replacing structures and extending or replacing bridges are all part of the job.

Copies of specifications are available at the USBR and may be had by contacting E. Laton Stephens, district operations superintendent, by phone or letter. Work is to be started about six weeks after bids have been awarded.

Grasshopper Threat Nil

While the first big band of Mormon crickets this year are reported heading for their favorite area—the Butter Creek wheat fields south of Ordinance in Eastern Oregon, the Klamath county farm agent's office is checking on the grasshopper situation here.

The dark green crickets do not menace this area as a rule, County Agent C. A. Henderson said, but the grasshoppers can cause a lot of damage. A trip to the Fort Klamath and Upper Klamath marsh area where the hoppers are usually the worst showed no hatching as yet and the ground is still too damp and cold.

Some "lubbers" were about, Henderson said—these are the early fat hoppers that can't fly and make such good fish bait. Warm weather will bring out the new crop of hoppers and the CA office is ready to start control practices with spray or dust being distributed by air as soon as weather conditions are right.
