The USA have part of the cemetery (which is the largest in the world) for the dead of the last war and the one just ended. There are thousands of white crosses in what can be termed a very beautiful huge garden. I can never really explain it but it's like a room after laughing children have left. Something remains behind—but the children just aren't there.

"I always think it a pity to mourn the dead too much for life is truly eternal and I only wish I could convey what I felt at Brookwood to every mother who has a loved one there. It's really a piece of America in Britain. I shall always visit it when I am that way. There's such a nice GI in charge—he's from Ohio—I told him all about our friendship and he was pleased I knew Americans."
