## WEATHER

**WESTERN OREGON**—Partly cloudy with few showers southern part; increasing cloudiness tonight. Tuesday mostly cloudy with rain probably very light; cooler Tuesday, high today 69-70; low tonight 42-43. Moderate northwesterly winds off coast this morning becoming moderate to fresh southwesterly tonight.

**EASTERN OREGON**—Considerable cloudiness today and Tuesday with scattered showers; not much temperature change; high 68-70; low tonight 42-42.

## Americans Pay Tribute To War Dead

New pledges to preserve peace, freedom and liberty were voiced in many lands yesterday as Americans paid tribute to this country's war dead.

President Truman interrupted a week-end of Potomac river yachting to place a wreath at the tomb of the Unknown Soldier in Arlington National cemetery.

In a radio address he voiced the hope that the Memorial Day celebrations around the globe would underline two things:  
"That the government of the United States works only for peace in the world, and order to attain that peace we must have the ability to enforce it."

In a second ceremony in Washington, Mr. Truman put a rose in a floral anchor that was dropped in the Potomac in honor of his predecessor, Franklin D. Roosevelt.

The president also sent a message to the Jewish war veterans of the United States holding their 33rd annual memorial service in New York.

"It is not enough that we pay lip service to those who died in the fight to bring tolerance and good will to the world," he said in that message. "We must ever keep in our hearts the need for the understanding and peace among all peoples wherever they may be. Under God, let us hold high the torch of freedom and justice for all people."

At the American military cemetery of Notre Dame near Dinant, Belgium—burial place of those who died in the Battle of the Bulge, in the Ardennes Wood and at Bastogne—Gen. Lucius D. Clay, United States commander in Europe, declared:  
"We shall not fail these heroes in our efforts to establish and maintain freedom."

## Flooded City Was Wartime Ship Center

VANPORT, Ore., May 31 (AP)—This city rose with the same startling speed that it vanished.

Its 10,286 apartments went up in nine months on the 647-acre lowland site north of Portland. Started in the fall of 1942, it was completed in the summer of 1943.

Within three miles were three Henry Kaiser shipyards and it at first was known as Kaiserville. The maritime commission was in charge of construction under a shipyards facility contract and administration was in the hands of the Portland Housing Authority.

On the day it was completed it was Oregon's second largest city, housing 25,000 persons—shipyard workers and their families.

It cost \$26,000,000.

The eastern part of the city—East Vanport—lay across Denver avenue from the main part of town. When the war ended and shipyard workers began to drift away, East Vanport's 1,000-plus buildings were moved to other housing-short cities. A few Vanport buildings were moved.

When the flood hit, many of its 18,700 residents had been there since the town was built. Mostly, however, it had become known as a veterans' city.

To meet postwar overcrowding at colleges, the state set up Vanport college, a two-year institution. It was near the dike's break and among the first to go under.
