"This is the Hour" was sung by the chorus and the recessional was by Helene Fischer.

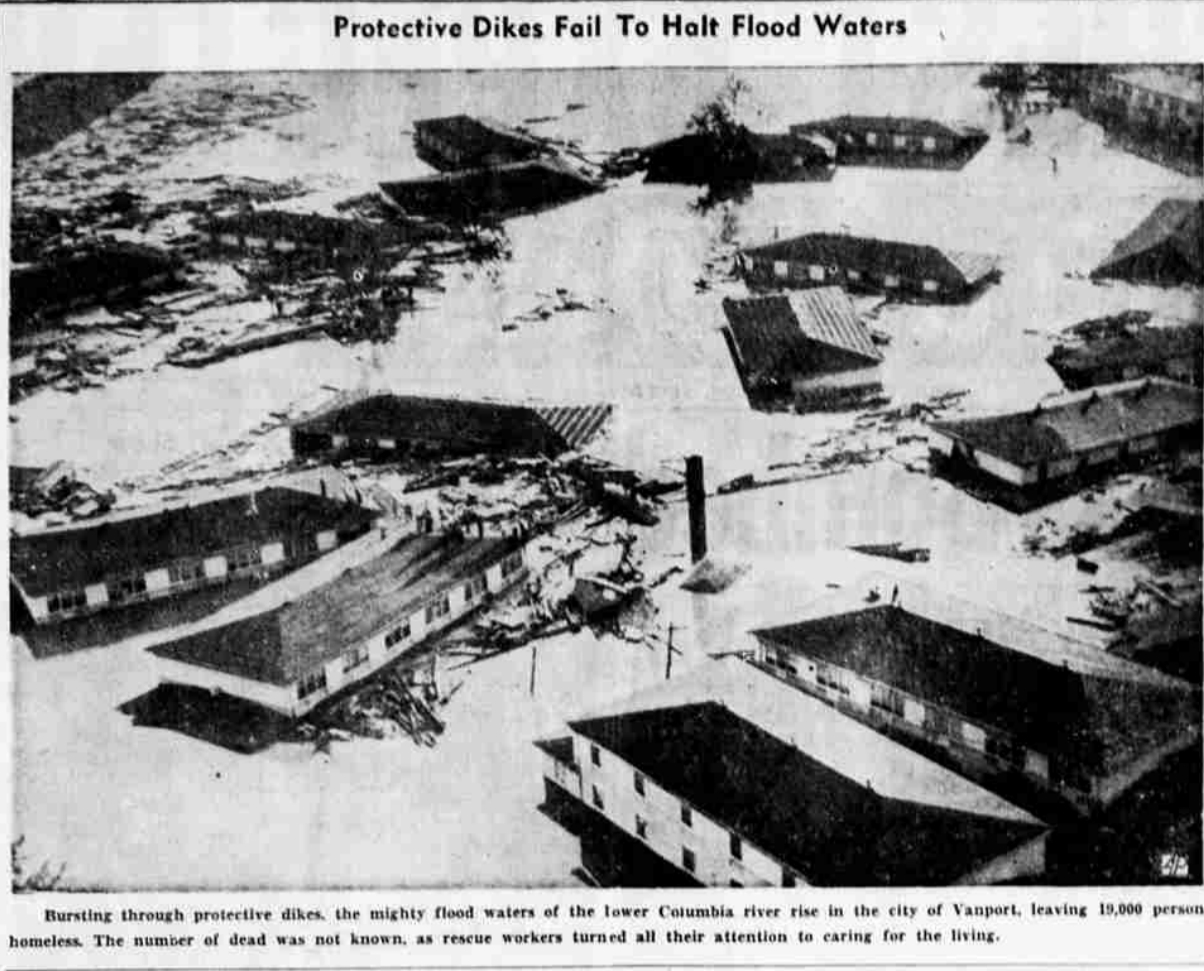
The class presented Mrs. Erickson with an orchid corsage and on the previous Sunday honored her with a luncheon and handkerchief shower at the home of Sally Thomas.

# Opposition Rises Over Mundt Bill

WASHINGTON, June 1 (AP)—Belligerent opponents of the Mundt-Nixon anti-communist bill threatened today to lead a protest demonstration at the capitol Wednesday.

Len Goldsmith of New York, executive secretary of the committee for democratic rights, said "thousands of people" will be on hand to demand a hearing before the senate judiciary committee.

There were angry shouts from the audience when the committee closed public hearings yesterday on the house-passed bill to force registration of communists. A group of about 20 men and women were waiting to testify.

"We're tired of being shoved around," Goldsmith shouted. "We demand the right to be heard."

But Senator Wiley (R-Wis.), committee chairman, already had left the committee room. Acting

Chairman Ferguson (R-Mich.) said he had no authority to continue the hearings.

# Federal Aid Pledged For Flood Areas

WASHINGTON, June 1 (AP)—President Truman today ordered "full resources of the federal government" mobilized for aid in the Pacific Northwest flood disaster.

He directed the army, the interior department and housing officials to investigate and make recommendations for "additional legislative authority to meet emergencies of this character."

The president wrote Maj. Gen. Philip B. Fleming, federal works administrator, directing him to coordinate all federal agencies working on the disaster.

The letter said: "Dear General Fleming: The disaster caused by the unprecedented floods in the Pacific Northwest makes it imperative that the full resources of the federal government be mobilized immediately to furnish such emergency assistance as can be made available through the various federal agencies. The housing and home finance agencies and the corps of engineers are already rendering emergency assistance, but their efforts can and should be supplemented by those of other federal agencies. Accordingly, I am directing you to coordinate the efforts of all federal agencies in alleviating hardship and suffering caused by this disaster."

# Powder Puff Derby Starts

PALM SPRINGS, Calif., June 1 (AP)—Five light private airplanes carrying six feminine fliers took off from here early today in a 2600-mile Powder Puff Air derby to Miami, Fla.

First away was Jeanne D'Ambly of Palm Springs. She was clocked off at 5:38 a. m. Pacific daylight time.

The race was limited to stock model planes of 250 horsepower or less.

Other entrants in order of their takeoff—spaced five minutes apart—were Frances Nolde, Reading, Pa.; Dorothy Krovoska, Stockton, Calif.; and Claire McMillen, Santa Ana, Calif., accompanied by her twin sister, Betty McMillen Loufek.

Mary Nelson, Palm Springs, withdrew.

Another entrant, Darlene Thurmond, Van Nuys, Calif., was delayed in the takeoff. Her plane, being ferried here from its home hangar, was grounded at Colton, Calif.

She expects to get away later.
