

Gems Grab Short Tilt

Art Moyer Notches 4th Win

A drizzle of rain that was more or less local to the Crest street ballpark region called off last night's baseball game at the end of five innings but not before the Gems had written a 9-5 victory over the Willows Cardinals into the books. The Gems now have a two-game winning streak alive and will be trying to make it three straight tonight—barring the unpredictable weather—at 7:30.

Little Art Moyer gained his fourth win against one loss for the season in the sawed-off game and can thank some heavy stick work on the part of his teammates for it.

The boys were as strong with the bat last night as they had been weak the night before. Moyer gave up nine hits, three for extra bases, and walked five.

Tom Anson, righthander, started for the Cards and was the loser. He was relieved in the fourth by Southpaw Al Harding.

Willows got one run in the first frame on a walk and three singles and added a couple more in the second by way of Haig Apolain's triple to right, Anson's double and two Gem errors.

Klamath Falls went ahead with a four-run spurge in the last of the second. Joe Anselmo and Tom Mankey connected for consecutive triples. Nick Mutt beat out an infield roller to score Mankey. Hill Beeson and Dick Descalzo walked, filling the bases, and Wallace scored the tying run on Moyer's fly-out. Beeson had taken third on the play and scored on Rick Small's single to put Klamath ahead.

Three more runs, result of a walk, double by Mutt and three-bagger by Beeson, iced the game for the Gems in the third and a couple more were added in the fourth.

Meanwhile, the Cards scored once in the fourth and again in the fifth to make the count 9-5.

A drizzle of rain started in the last half of the fifth and after a 20-minute delay the game was called.

Brooks Start Climbing Out Of Basement

Cards Have Lost Six Straight, Go Farther Down

Slowly but surely the Brooklyn Dodgers are climbing back into the National league pennant race.

The defending champions, after a disastrous start that found them in and out of last place, are in sixth place today, only five games behind the pace-setting New York Giants and two games out of the first division.

Manager Leo Durocher's pitching staff has suddenly righted itself with big Ralph Branca, Preacher Roe and Joe Hatten leading the way.

In the last seven starts Durocher's opening selection has gone the distance five times. During this streak the Dodgers have won five games, lost one and tied one.

Hatten went the route for the second time this season last night, pitching the Brooks to a 5-3 victory over the fading Cardinals in a night game at St. Louis. It was the Dodgers' first victory in five meetings with the Cards, who now have lost six straight.

DROPPED BEHIND
By losing, the Cards dropped a game and a half behind the Giants who trampled the Reds, 7-4, in a day game at Cincinnati.

Larry Jansen, star Giant righthander, scattered 11 Red hits in posting his sixth win of the year. Jansen helped his own cause by driving in three runs on two singles.

The third place Pittsburgh Pirates also lost ground, falling two games behind the Giants as they bowed, 5-1, to the Boston Braves in a night game at Pittsburgh.

Johnny Sain held the Pirates to three safeties, one of which was Ralph Kiner's 12th home run of the year in the ninth inning.

In the American league the Cleveland Indians retained their slim first place margin over the Philadelphia Athletics. The Indians dropped a 2-1 five-hit decision to Rae Scarborough and the Washington Senators, but remained seven percentage points ahead of the A's at the Athletics also lost, 7-3, to the Chicago White Sox.

Bob Lemon, who entered the night game unscored on in 25 straight innings, went the route for Cleveland in his third loss as against seven wins.

COASTED THROUGH
The last place White Sox raked Bill Dietrich and Nelson Potter for 11 hits in their after dark struggle in Philadelphia while Joe Haynes halted the A's on nine safeties in coasting to his fourth victory.

St. Louis' surprising Browns moved over the Detroit Tigers into fourth place as a result of their 3-1 night game triumph over the Red Sox in Boston.

Fred Sanford checked the Sox on seven blows while his mates collected nine off Lefty Mel Parrill.

The Tigers, who now trail the Browns by a game, lost a 1-0 decision to the Yankees in a day game at New York.

In the only other day game, the Chicago Cubs nosed out the Philadelphia Phillies, 2-1 in 12 innings at Chicago.

Boxing Men See Danger Signs In Third Zale - Graziano Meeting

NEW YORK (NEA)—Boxing men see grave danger in the third meeting of Rocky Graziano and Tony Zale at Newark's Ruppert Stadium, June 9.

The flouting by one state of the authority of another isn't the principal reason. And regardless of how you feel about Graziano being barred in New York for refusing to take a bribe in a fight that did not take place, that's bad.

Making it even worse is the fact that Commissioner Abe J. Greene of New Jersey is the perennial president of the National Boxing association.

It is difficult to see how Greene expects to build a truly national organization by totally disregarding an edict of the important governing group in the land.

Professional boxing is the only sport—if it can be called that—which so readily sacrifices the game for an individual.

What those with the best interests of boxing at heart are afraid of in this instance, however, is the risk of another ring fatality.

Eight men, four in this country, have been killed in the ring this year in an all-time record for a period of six months.

An Ernie Schaaf, a Jimmy Doyle or the opponent of a top-notch, such as Sam Baroudi, has to die before any fuss is made about these tragedies. The others go practically unnoticed.

But there is a genuine cause for apprehension in the renewal of the Graziano-Zale series.

Zale celebrated his 34th birthday in training. The Gary steel-worker has been throwing leather 15 years or longer, exclusive of the three he spent in the navy.

He had 95 fights as an amateur, 85 as a professional, and there were few soft touches among the pros.

Vic Raschi Looking Better Every Game

NEW YORK, June 3 (AP)—Bucky Harris, manager of the New York Yankees, is tickled pink every time he thinks of a trade that didn't go through.

The trade that never came off involved several big names on the Yankees and Washington Senators. "Only one thing ruined the deal."

Raschi is the latest pitching "remarkable" on the world champions. The 29-year-old righthander, who played with Portland in the Pacific Coast league last year, now in his sophomore season in the big leagues, has just about clinched the No. 1 berth on the Yankees' pitching staff. After losing his season's inaugural, Vic has reeled off six victories in a row and has looked better each succeeding performance.

His latest victory, the 1-0 shutout he twirled against the Detroit Tigers yesterday, was, by his own admission, the best game he has pitched in the majors.

"I relied mostly on fast balls today," he said.
