

Spud Support Eligibility Dates Slated

Eligibility for potato support price is based on growers planting within their goal and signing a certificate of eligibility before a specified date. The specified closing date for "A" certificates, costing 1 cent per sack, ends on July 15th. For "B" certificates, closing date is September 15. Anyone failing to secure certificates before that date is not eligible for support. "A" certificates will cost 1 cent per acre yield, or \$1.50 per acre. "B" certificates will cost 2 cents per sack or at a rate of \$3.00 per acre.

Adequate certificate forms have not yet been received at the county office and certificates will not be issued until after these are on hand in quantity. Notice will be given when this sign-up should get under way.

Floods Slow Meat Plants

Flood waters of the Columbia river are threatening to interfere with meat packing and livestock marketing operations at North Portland for a time, according to the OSC review on meat animals and wool. This review is prepared by the college from U. S. department of agriculture reports and other data.

The market was closed Monday for the holiday but river levels Tuesday caused closing of most packing plants, it was reported, and one large rendering plant was closed last week.

Holding pens of several plants are under water and sewage disposal is disrupted. Many lowland cattle are now being held on North Portland stockyards hunting pasture until water recedes.

Cathlamet Bay To Get Reserve Fleet

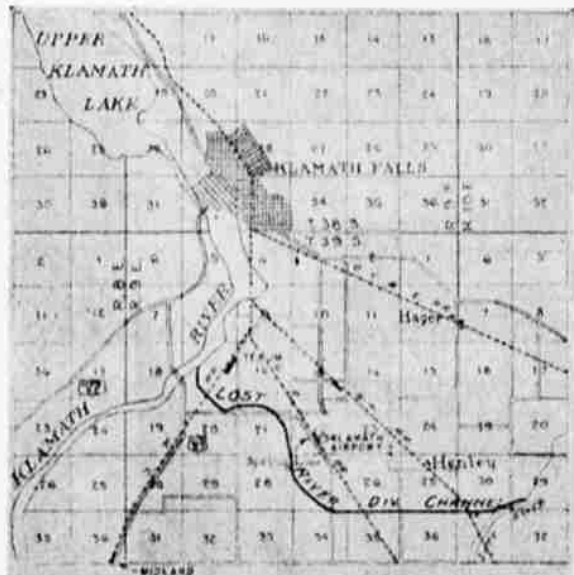
WASHINGTON, June 3 (AP)—The maritime commission approved finally Wednesday the selection of Cathlamet bay, Ore., as a site for permanently mooring the Pacific Northwest reserve merchant fleet.

When the selection first was announced Washington state interests protested, insisting part of the fleet

be moored in Puget sound. The commission notified Senator Cordon (R-Ore.) it had instructed army engineers to start at once to prepare the site for use by the fleet.

Dr. Evans now is on sick leave. The appointment will become effective when the six-months sick leave ends.

Dr. Evans has been superintendent for 11 years, and has been on the hospital staff more than 40 years. He resigned as superintendent because of ill health. Dr. Bates is now serving as acting superintendent.
