Suit Filed In Auto Accident

A damage suit for \$25,000 growing out of an automobile accident near Henley has been brought against William Henderson of Malibu by Pauline Davis of Klamath Falls. Miss Davis was injured in the collision March 14.

She was a passenger in a car owned by Charles Whitmeyer and driven by Tommy Moore, both of Klamath Falls. Henderson was alone in his car at the time of the accident.

The damage suit charges Henderson with speeding and reckless driving on icy pavement. U. S. Balentine is attorney for Miss Davis.

Another damage suit, this one for \$10,000, has been filed against the Southern Pacific railway company by Joseph H. Dirschl. The plaintiff contends he was permanently injured when he tripped over a brake shoe in the SP yard March 11, 1947.

Truman Stop Here Short

President Harry Truman's brief stop in Klamath Falls will be non-political and he may even be in bed when his train enters the local Southern Pacific yards.

The SP schedule as it now stands, advises that the president's train leaves Portland at 1:45 p. m. June 11, and arrives in Klamath Falls at 10:50 p. m. There is a 15-minute schedule for re-servicing and the train will pull out of yards here at 11:05 p. m.

This — of course — on the old schedule. Daylight saving goes into effect here Sunday at midnight which actually means that the president's train pulls in here at 11:50 p. m. and out at 12:05 a. m.

Pat Ivory, democratic leader, said he received word from State Democratic Chairman Byron Carney today that Truman's stop here would be "strictly non-political." Ivory said it was unlikely that a delegation would meet the train unless such action is requested by the state committee.

Washout Cuts Off Rail Traffic

SEATTLE, June 2 (AP)—Great Northern railway officials reported today that a washout had cut off rail service between Vancouver, B.C., and Puget sound points.

All Vancouver's rail service to the east over Canadian lines was cut last week.

The Great Northern reported a 2000-foot washout by the Fraser river, south of the bridge at New Westminster, shortly before 8 a. m. Morning trains were held at Vancouver and Seattle. A decision on whether shuttle service would be provided around the break was delayed pending a check on whether the highway is passable in the area.

Red Clover, Alsike Importations Gain

Imports of red clover like alsike and Ladino, are much larger this year than last, agricultural reports show, and now exceed two and one-half million pounds.

There are still no imports of crested fescue, compared to 576,000 pounds last year. The amount of meadow fescue is down about 50 per cent.

Floods Slow Train Travel

Flood conditions in the Columbia river area were felt throughout the Pacific Northwest and railroad men here said that constant revisions in schedules had to be made by rail lines feeding into the flooded area to the north.

Southern Pacific, for example, has transferred the moving of all perishable laden cars over to the Great Northern out of Klamath Falls. Already some 100 cars of perishables have been shifted over, going to the Oregon trunk junction at Celilo above The Dalles.

From this point the GN hands the cars over to the Union Pacific which has worked out a route to Seattle points.

Normal movements out of here via the Southern Pacific is north to Portland and thence delivery to connecting lines such as Union Pacific, Northern Pacific and Great Northern.

Further north, in the Seattle district, railroad operations were disrupted. The Spokane, Portland and Seattle railway Tuesday halted all traffic over its main line from Kennewick to Vancouver, Wash., pulling out the last remaining link between Seattle and California points.

Graveling Of Streets Urged

Good weather has again prompted the city to urge property owners to do all possible to gravel unpaved streets and alleyways.

Street Committee Chairman A. P. Condry said today that the city will be glad to send its grader and other equipment anywhere in town to level roadways and help with the work.

Under the Hancock law, it is impossible for the city to pave or gravel streets unless property owners petition the city for an improvement project and share the costs equally. Cost of graveling is about \$12.50 or \$13 a lot, Condry said. Anyone interested in further information may call the city engineer's office, 6515, or Condry, 7494.
