Truman Revises Travel Schedule—SPOKANE, June 3 (AP)—President Truman's itinerary for his visit to Washington state next week has been revised, eliminating stops at Pasco, Kennewick, Richland and Prosser. Jack Gorrie, assistant to Gov. Mon C. Wallgren, said today. Gorrie said the president will leave Spokane Wednesday at 10 a. m. for Grand Coulee dam. The presidential party then will board a train at Ephrata and will continue west to Olympia over the Great Northern railroad. The president will make platform appearances at Wenatchee and Everett en route, Gorrie said.

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Dikes Built To Protect Farmlands

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as the one now running out to sea, this was his grim warning: "Portland and Vancouver, look out!"

Portland and Vancouver—across the Columbia—are at the confluence of the great river and the Willamette, biggest stream arising in Oregon.

One thing was sure—the weather is against the flood-weary people. Mid-summer temperatures to melt snowpacks in the upper reaches too fast. Thundershowers to dump new water into the watersheds of Eastern Washington, Oregon and Idaho.

Fisher said the Snake river, main Columbia tributary, was on the rise. So was the Yakima river in Washington. And overflow from Grand Coulee on the upper Columbia has increased the past four days.

Any new flood will add to the cost of reconstruction that already is in the planning stages for the four-state region.

Lt. Gen. Raymond A. Wheeler, chief of U. S. army engineers, promised adequate funds to repair all Columbia basin levees. He arrived here yesterday from Washington. Senators and representatives from the region asked congress yesterday to appropriate \$75,000,000 for reconstruction of public works. President Truman requested \$600,000 for emergency relief.

Lines Replaced—Ruptured gas and telephone lines between Portland and Vancouver were being replaced. The Spokane, Portland & Seattle railroad started rebuilding washed-out tracks, hoping to restore Portland-Seattle traffic by Saturday. The Oregon state highway department began work on a new approach to the interstate bridge between Portland and Vancouver.

Meanwhile, the battle to hold dikes continued in the Portland area as well as downstream. Here the critical points were soft levees protecting Portland airport and the Reynolds aluminum plant further upstream at Troutdale. The plant was closed down and workers joined dike-holstering crews.

Nine dikes were the danger points along the 40-mile stretch drive of the current crest to the sea. The most serious was Magruder dike which was described as in "poor" condition. The Midland almost broke last night. Beaver, Midland, Webb, Marshland and Svedson also were endangered. Only Westland and Brownsmead were described as "good."

In Astoria, civilian volunteers were organized to work in the nine-dike area in relays of 100.

Dikes Bolstered—Dangerous dikes also were being bolstered in the Longview area of Southwestern Washington. Some were seeping badly but army engineers believed they would hold.

Pressure eased on Portland's waterfront. The swollen Willamette still lapped into Union station, the city's only rail terminal, and thinly covered rail yards and some other industrial areas. The river was receding slightly.

At Creston, B. C., there was another battle of the dikes. The Kootenay river already has poured over its banks in spots and swept thousands of acres of grain fields.

Well Known Matron Dies

Death took another Klamath Falls pioneer with the passing of Mrs. Fred (Augusta Gromann) Heilbroner, 82, at 7:55 p. m. Wednesday. Mrs. Heilbroner had been in ill health for some time.

The beloved Klamath matron was born January 24, 1866, in Bremen, Germany. She came to this country as a young girl and was married to the late Mr. Heilbroner on November 9, 1894, in New York City.

The family moved to Klamath Falls on August 20, 1905 and lived here for a brief time before taking up a homestead near Bonanza in 1906.

Returning to Klamath Falls, the older Heilbronners took up residence on the old Joseph Conger homestead on Link river in 1917. The family home is still on the river.

Mrs. Heilbroner had two children. Mrs. Florence Hill died this past year in Eugene. One son, Fred Heilbroner, is a well known Klamath Falls businessman.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 3 (AP)—Greater republican control of the California assembly was indicated today by latest returns in Tuesday's primary election.

Out of 49 districts where the vote was conclusive or a candidate had virtually won election through having no major party opposition, the republicans had taken 31 seats and the democrats 18. The remaining contests will be decided by later returns or by a runoff in the November general election.

Inconclusive results on the senate appeared to indicate the republicans would continue to control the upper house by approximately the present margin, 26 to 12.

With three vacancies, the present lineup in the assembly is republican 45, democrats 29. In the congressional races, Mrs. Helen Gahagan Douglas (D) spurred to dual nomination in the 14th Los Angeles district, winning the republican primary in the late count after trailing W. Wallace Braden throughout. Her double win brought to four

the number of democrats who will be without major opposition next November. The republicans apparently also had won both democratic and republican nomination, making a total of 12 incumbent congressmen and one newcomer who captured both major party nominations.
