

Plywood Firm Denies Try In Monopoly Case

WASHINGTON, June 2 (AP)—The federal trade commission said today that the Douglas Fir Plywood association, Tacoma, Wash., and 30 plywood corporations have denied a commission complaint that they had engaged in monopolistic practices resulting in less production and higher prices.

The commission has accused the association and corporations with conspiring to fix prices and restraining competition.

Their answer to the complaint said there is active competition in the plywood industry and that pricing practices from 1941 to 1946 complied with OPA regulations.

The commission said the answer also stated that since 1946 each corporation has stopped some of those practices voluntarily and without agreement with any other firms.

The answer said of the firms named in the complaint, Olympic Plywood company, Shelton, Wash., and Simpson Industries, Seattle, have been dissolved and their assets transferred to Simpson Logging company, also of Shelton.

The commission said it was informed the Eugene Plywood company, Eugene, Ore., and Pacific Plywood Corporation, Willamina, Ore., have merged with Olympia Veneer company, Olympia, Wash., and the name of the latter then changed to Associated Plywood Mills, Eugene.

Edie G. Walton and E. D. Walton trading as Walton Plywood company, Everett, Wash., told the commission they have sold their business. Smith-Wood Products, Inc., Kansas City, Mo., said it no longer sells plywood products.

The commission said a hearing will be held later in the case. No date for it has been set.

Plane Burns On Take-Off

OMAK, Wash., June 2 (AP)—Twenty-one men scrambled to safety from a burning national guard cargo plane here last night.

The C-47 caught fire as it took off from the Omak field for Spokane. Crash-landed, it burned completely as the crew of three and 18 national guardsmen fled the flaming gasoline which poured from the ruptured tanks.

The guardsmen were being returned to Spokane after a week's work in the flood area.

One man was hospitalized for observation. Several others suffered minor burns.

The plane was piloted by Lt. Col. Frank Frost, commander of the 116th national guard fighter squadron based at Spokane.

Former Attorney Takes Own Life

DENVER, June 2 (AP)—Ben B. Laska, Denver attorney convicted of accepting ransom money in a sensational 1933 kidnaping, was found dead today at his home. Detective Sgt. Arthur A. Roush said Laska left six notes indicating suicide.

Laska was convicted in 1935 at Oklahoma City of accepting \$10,000 of the ransom money paid in the kidnaping of Charles F. Urschel. Laska was accused of accepting the money as a fee to defend Albert L. Bates, one of the kidnapers. Laska was given a 10 year sentence and released on a parole in June 1941. President Truman granted him a full pardon in March, 1947.

After the pardon, Laska sought reinstatement to the Colorado bar. His request was pending at his death.

Roush said Laska's body was found by his stepdaughter, Mrs. Charlotte Eilers.

Here Are Contest Rules For The Herald And News 4-H Spud Growing Contest

To promote interest in the production of large yields of high quality potatoes, The Herald and News is sponsoring a 4-H potato-growing contest.

- The award will be based on the largest yield of No. 1's. Here are rules of the contest:
1. Club member must have a minimum of one acre of potatoes which must be staked out soon after planting time.
 2. If club member is growing more than one acre of potatoes, he may select any one of his own acres for the contest, but he must be able to determine his field from his father's.
 3. Any boy or girl regularly enrolled in a 4-H potato project who is keeping a record of his work, is entitled to compete, but he must let his club leader or the county agent know not later than August 1.
 4. 4-H club member must notify one of the potato inspectors of time of digging so that the percentage of U. S. No. 1's may be secured from a field inspection.
 5. All sacks of potatoes from your acre must be weighed in the field or over certified scales.
 6. Club member is to notify club leader or the county club agent when digging, so that a member of the extension office or your local leader may assist in weighing.

Russ Zone In Germany Said 'Police State'

The British military government said the Russian occupation zone of Germany is a police state where "Soviet ruthlessness" has eliminated virtually all political opposition.

The report was the most scathing ever made by one of the four occupation powers against another. It said Germans opposing the Russians in Eastern Germany are "apprehensive that nothing short of force will improve conditions." The report was calculated to combat communist efforts to extend the communist influence.

Meanwhile, 20,000 Berlin transport workers struck for more pay and food, keeping most of the 4,000,000 Germans in the capital at home. The Americans hanged seven Ger-

man doctors and elite guard officers, convicted of killing and maiming thousands in experiments at concentration camps.

Pope Pius asked in a speech for "just and necessary social reforms" to provide houses, food and work for the needy. He said peace is the world's greatest problem. He decried bloodshed in Greece and China and hailed the truce in Palestine.

Out on a tiny island of Kwajalein atoll, American marines killed a Japanese who fired on them. He had been hiding there since capture of the Marshall Island base in February, 1944, and apparently thought the Japanese surrender was just a hoax.
