More Money Urged For Park Upkeep

WASHINGTON, June 4 (AP)—Additional funds for construction work in national parks were urged today by Newton B. Drury, director of the park service.

He told a senate appropriations subcommittee considering the house-passed interior bill that \$1,527,250 which was cut from President Truman's request should be restored. If the money is put back in, he said, it is planned to allocate it to projects which include:

Olympic National park, Washington, heart of the hills road grading and bridge, \$251,000.

Mount Rainier National park, Washington, Stevens canyon road, temporary Muddy Fork bridge, \$13,200.

Mount McKinley National park, Alaska, \$11,900.

Glacier Bay National monument, Alaska, \$125,660.

He also commented: "Out of the \$3,210,000 approved by the house for roads and trails, \$2,500,000 must be allocated to maintenance work and \$25,000 to administrative costs."

"As the house earmarked \$260,000 for specific construction projects in the Great Smoky Mountains National park in North Carolina and Tennessee and \$25,000 for Oregon Caves National monument, only \$400,000 is left for new construction work, including \$100,000 for roads in Alaskan areas."

Sun Melts Snowpack To Swell Rivers

new record late last night—534,650 cubic feet a second.

The Snake rose more than a foot yesterday at Lewiston, Ida. On the Canadian headwaters of the Columbia, the smelter city of Trail, B. C., evacuated a street as flood waters edged higher.

Veteran Columbia forecasters said they do not expect the new crest to equal the height of the old one.

Elmer Fisher said, "From present indications, the previous crest will not be reached or surpassed" when the new flood rolls down into the lower valley. He predicted 29.3 feet for Portland Monday—about one-half foot below last Tuesday's peak.

But any new flood will prolong the devastating effects of the old one that has left some 29,000 persons homeless in the United States and Canada, crippled communications and transportation, and disrupted industrial and agricultural operations.

Rehabilitation Hit
It could be another blow, too, at the vast rehabilitation machine that is hitting its stride five days after the war-built city of Vanport was swept away.

The federal government swung into emergency and long-range battles against destruction and suffering.

President Truman will make a personal survey of the area June 11. The interior department promised, through Assistant Secretary C. Girard Davidson, manpower and equipment without waiting for appropriations of funds by congress.

Congress has been asked for \$75,000,000 to repair damage to public works. Mr. Truman also asked for \$600,000 for emergency relief.

No Bodies Found

The complete destruction of Vanport still has not added to the total of known dead. But there was indication anew that some of its 18,700 inhabitants perished and their bodies are being held in the submerged wreckage.

The Red Cross said it has been unable to locate 11 children and two adults since the Memorial Day disaster.

Authorities, meanwhile, had their hands full trying to keep impatient evacuees from returning to danger areas in southwestern Washington and Northwestern Oregon. Hundreds of farm families sought to go back to their homes despite the twin hazards of flood and disease.

The air force pressed some 30 transport planes into emergency hauling of 500,000 sandbags from Stockton, Calif. Dike workers have almost exhausted their supply.

Portland, and prompted five officials to deny them.

The commanding general of the Oregon national guard, a state police captain, the Multnomah county sheriff and the county coroner all said not a body has been found.

Meanwhile salvage operations began at Vanport. Boatmen retrieved some household goods from upper floors above the water level.

A diver and a boat-mounted derrick raised the Vanport post office safe, which held records for more than \$100,000 of postal savings accounts.

Another diver was clearing debris from the break in the Denver avenue fill, where one of the approaches to the Interstate bridge to Vancouver, Wash., was washed out.

Repair of the break in the Union avenue fill started. This route was the only other approach to the Interstate bridge. The break there was found to be 51 feet deep. The new fill will include a 92-foot trestle to allow waters to drain off when the river recedes. It is expected to be completed in four days.

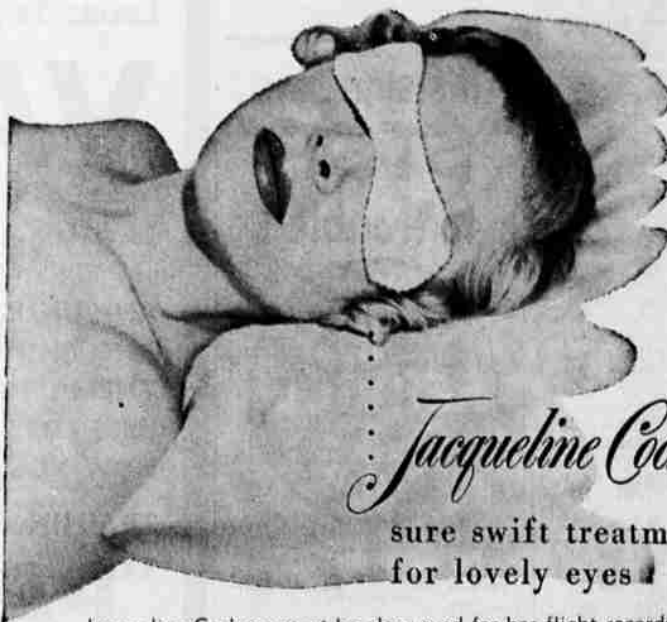
