

Good Well Found By Road Crew

A whopping good flow of water averaging about 14 gallons to the minute and testing 180 degrees, has satisfied engineers on the north entrance job and the well near the Esplanade railroad crossing was capped off late Wednesday.

The well was sunk 425 feet and the artesian flow is all that they hoped for, state highwaymen said here today.

Hot water will be used in the interlocking pipes which will heat the approach to the government canal bridge on Esplanade.

Rogers construction company resumed grading on the north entrance Tuesday morning when the big equipment was brought back to Klamath Falls from Diamond Lake junction where a widening job was completed at the point where the Chiloquin cut-off enters the old highway.

Today, crews will start laying sewer pipes, installing manholes and completing other operations along Esplanade near the canal. As soon as this work is done, workers will start grading under the railroad. Surfacing with rock and gravel all the way to the north end of the job is next on order.

Hot water pipes will be laid before the pavement is poured at the canal between the railroad and the bridge.

Redding Line Gets New Busses

HST To Talk With Striking Boeing Union

SEATTLE, June 4 (AP)—President Truman will confer with heads of the striking Aeronautical Mechanics' union (Ind.) regarding the Boeing Airplane company strike, the union said today.

Union spokesmen said the meeting between Mr. Truman and Harold J. Gibson, union president, was arranged by Governor Mon Wallgren. It will be held in Seattle during the president's visit here June 10.

At that time, the union reported, petitions prepared by the union and circulated by business men who have been hard-hit by the strike will be presented to the chief executive requesting his aid in a settlement.

Advised of the petition and conference, President William M. Allen of Boeing said he, too, would be delighted to hold a private conference with President Truman at any time he might suggest.

He would "like to point out" to the president, Allen said, "that neither the company nor our workmen nor our community can look to the future with any reasonable degree of confidence unless Boeing is permitted to operate on a competitive basis with other aircraft manufacturers."

Nearly 15,000 Boeing workers went on strike April 2 in support of demands for a 30-cent an hour pay boost, eight paid holidays and continuation of seniority clauses in the contract.
