The Doctor Says— Kidney Stones Dangerous

Those who have "passed" a kidney stone usually say that this is the worst pain they have ever had. Occasionally a stone may "pass" without severe pain, but this is rare.

Most kidney stones are formed in what is called the pelvis of the kidney, that is, the irregular-shaped space inside the kidney which empties into the ureter or passageway leading to the bladder. Later they pass into the ureter, into the bladder and out in the urine. They may stick in the ureter where they frequently produce terrific pain and bleeding.

Stones may occur at any age but are most common between 25 and 40. They often grow so slowly and cause few, if any, symptoms. Therefore, they may have existed for many years before a diagnosis.

CAUSES UNKNOWN

Causes of stone formation are not entirely known, but a good many explanations have been suggested, including slowed urinary circulation.

the stone does not stay permanently lodged in the ureter. If it should stay there, it can produce serious complications.

Location of most stones can be discovered by X-ray, and physicians can generally remove the stones or assist them to pass if that is necessary.

Another important aspect of treatment besides removal of an existing stone is the prevention of additional stone formation. This is often a difficult problem and may involve regulating the acidity of the urine, elimination of infections and the careful choice of diet.

QUESTION: I have been bothered with pinworms. What can be done about this?

ANSWER: There are several methods of treating pinworms. The substance which has the greatest popularity today is a dye called gentian violet. Others are hexyl-resorcinol and santalol. Self-treatment is not advisable.
