Selling Hits Stock Market

NEW YORK, June 4 (AP)—A steady stream of selling orders put the stock market on the defensive in the last hour of trading today and prices declined over a broad front.

At the close losses of fractions to around 2 points were in a decisive majority.

Trading volume picked up a bit in late dealings and lifted the day's total to around 1,100,000 shares.

Weakness also developed in the grain and cotton markets.

Lower prices were paid for such stocks as U. S. Steel, General Motors, Montgomery Ward, J. I. Case, Caterpillar Tractor, Schenley, Phelps Dodge, J. C. Penney, American Woolen, Atlantic Coast Line and United Airlines.

Boeing and Lockheed held on to small gains for a while.

Mrs. Clarence Cooper and two young children, Lawrence Lee and Alan Ray, were evacuated Sunday night from their home in the Parkrose area near Portland, and yesterday arrived here to be with Mrs. Cooper's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Guy Bellant, 3943 Clinton.

Mrs. Cooper said she and her family worked until 3 o'clock in the morning getting out of the area and the highway near their home looked like a stream of wartime refugees with cars piled high and even ducks and chickens on the road.

The Parkrose school, of which James L. Brown, newly named Klamath Union high school principal is the head, has been named an evacuation center. Brown left here Tuesday to do what he could or residents of his area.
