League Studies Forest Program

In line with the League of Women Voters study of reforestation and conservation of timber resources in Oregon, the local league saw the film, "Green Harvest" at its May meeting, Wednesday, the 26th, at the Pelican cafe. The sound film is in technicolor and is a beautiful and interesting presentation of the science of "tree farming" or systematic harvesting of trees, which is being developed by one of the great lumber companies. Mrs. Stephen Sabo, chairman of the local league's forest conservation study program, introduced Ted Durment who presented the film.

Mrs. A. B. Hood, local member of the League, who attended the recent convention of the national league in Grand Rapids, Mich., gave a comprehensive report of her five days' activities. Six hundred and twenty-nine local and provincial leagues in 43 states were recognized, as well as an increase from 70,432 members in 1946 to 83,058 in 1947. Anna Lord Strauss, national president, stressed the keynote of the convention—"We must limit our program to the essential measures relevant to peace."

The hard working delegates came to four decisions—first to work for United States policies directed toward an enduring peace supported by a strong United Nations and made possible by a sound domestic and world economy. Second, to support promotion of international reconstruction, and extension of world trade. Third, to analyze federal taxes and expenditures to understand and support such fiscal policies as make for a stable domestic economy. Fourth, to support action on admission of displaced persons, federal aid to education, home rule for the District of Columbia, civilian control of atomic energy, repeal of the marginer tax, the "status of women" bill, "equal pay for equal work" bill, jury service for women and "alien husbands" bill.

Short reports were heard from two of the delegates to the state convention. Mrs. C. E. Dennis and Mrs. A. A. Montgomery. Mrs. John Yaden, local president, who also attended the state convention, advised that the Klamath County league will make a study of the proposed severance tax in line with the League's forest conservation study program. Mrs. Willard Duncan, radio chairman, reported on the activity of that committee during the recent registration campaign and commended both radio stations for their cooperation.
