NOTICE OF SPECIAL SCHOOL ELECTION
KLAMATH COUNTY SCHOOL DISTRICT

Notice is hereby given that a special school election will be held in and for Klamath County School District, Klamath County, Oregon, on Monday, the 1st day of June, 1948, at which election there will be submitted to the qualified voters of said District the following questions:

1. Shall the board of Directors of Klamath County School District, Klamath County, Oregon, be authorized, pursuant to Chapter 453, Oregon Laws, 1945, to issue a tax levy of ten (10) mill annually for five (5) years beginning July 1, 1948, which levies shall be outside and over the limitation imposed by Article XI Section Eleven, Oregon Constitution, for the purpose of creating a special reserve fund which may be later used for the replacement, repair and maintenance of school buildings and the replacement of school equipment and providing that said Board may use State or Federal matching funds should they become available.

A person qualified to vote at said election shall be 21 years of age who has resided in the District 30 days immediately preceding the date of election and who has property in the District as shown by the last County assessment, and not assessed by the Sheriff, which he or she is liable or subject to pay a tax. A person is also qualified who presents to the directors of election satisfactory evidence that he or she has stock, shares or ownership in any corporation, firm or partnership which has property in the District as shown by the last County assessment and not assessed by the Sheriff, upon which such corporation, firm, or partnership pays a tax, even though his or her individual name does not appear upon the tax roll.

Votes may be cast at any of the following polling places, between the hours of 2:00 o'clock P. M. and 7:00 o'clock P. M. on the day appointed for such election in said Elementary School Buildings of sub-districts:
