

Rail Lines Service To East Starts

PORTLAND, June 7 (AP)—Rail service has been resumed between Portland and Vancouver, Wash., and points east over the Spokane, Portland and Seattle railway.

Trunk line passenger trains from the East—via Spokane—are to arrive today on the SP&S. Temporary North Portland terminal and an intercity passenger shuttle service will be established beginning tomorrow morning.

E. B. Stanton, vice president of the SP&S, announced completion of a trestle bridging the washout of the North Portland fill—the break that caused the Vanport disaster—yesterday. Freight service began last night.

The shuttle service between Portland and Vancouver will start tomorrow and continue until the two broken highway trunks feeding the traffic from Portland to the Oregon approach to the interstate bridge are restored.

Trains will leave Portland, on daylight saving time, from 17th and Upshur street at 6 a.m., 9 a.m., 3 p.m., 6 p.m. and 9 p.m. The service from Vancouver will leave the passenger station there at 7 a.m., 10 a.m., 4 p.m., 7 p.m., and 10 p.m.

Flood water over the Northern Pacific line at Kalama, Wash., is expected to prevent restoration of Portland-Seattle rail links until mid-week.

Daily Double Pays Off \$1,845.80

BOSTON, June 7 (AP)—A daily double payoff of \$1,845.80 was registered Saturday at Suffolk Downs when Liberty B took the first race and Hy Flare triumphed in the second.

Liberty B returned \$55.00, \$22.80 and \$9.20 for \$2 in straight betting. Hy Flare returned \$23.40, \$9.40 and \$4.80.

The highest daily double on record is the \$19,732.40 return made possible by the victories of Joy Bet and Merry Caroline at Washington Park, Chicago, on August 14, 1939.

Conductor Conducts Too Vigorously
SPRINGFIELD, Ill., June 7 (AP)—Constantine Jones, conductor of the Springfield Symphony orchestra, has been sidelined from directing for a few days after an accident at a recent rehearsal.

During the rehearsal he suddenly raised his arms to signal a change in tempo. He felt a sharp pain and he believed he sprained a back muscle.

He consulted a physician and X-rays disclosed that a small bone in the vertebra had been chipped. A plaster cast has cramped his style of conducting.

December Is Worst Month For Wrecks

WASHINGTON, June 7 (AP)—If it's a Saturday, in December, and shortly after 6 p. m., you better "stop, look and listen," like they say on the railroad crossing warning signs.

The interstate commerce commission said Saturday in a report on 1947 rail-highway grade crossing accidents that the day, month and hour seem to provide the most likely setup for something undesirable to happen.

The commission reported that Saturdays kept right on being the top day for grade crossing collisions last year—just as they have been since 1935.

And for the fourth straight year, December produced more accidents of this type than any other month.

The hour of greatest frequency of accidents in 1947 was 6 to 6:59 p. m.—just slightly later than was the case in 1946.

The commission said grade crossing accidents rose slightly in 1947, from 4001 to 4015 as compared with 1946, but both fatalities and injuries declined. Total deaths at grade

crossing last year were 1790 against 1851 the year before, and injuries dropped to 4251 from 4397. Ninety per cent of these accidents involved motor vehicles, the remainder pedestrian or other traffic.

Portland Woman Dies In Wreck

PORTLAND, June 7 (AP)—Mrs. Mary Elinor Hoffman, 23, Portland, was injured fatally Sunday in a head-on collision of two cars on the Mount Hood loop highway Sunday east of Gresham.

Roy A. Mangress, 66, Beaverton, was critically injured and his wife, Edna, 56, was in serious condition.
