

Arab Troops Near Tel Aviv As Russians Start Move To Send Military Observers

 Arab troops fought within eight miles of Tel Aviv in Israeli territory today, while politicians weighed the 50-50 chance for a truce.

The Jews themselves acknowledged the loss of Wilhelms, eight miles east of their seat of government. The place is within heavy artillery range of Tel Aviv, but there was no indication the city was in any immediate peril.

The main action in the shooting war was 23 miles south of Tel Aviv at Isdud, and 30-odd miles to the northeast and around the central Arab triangle in North Central Palestine.

Forest Fire Danger Seen

SEATTLE, June 8 (AP)—The season's first forest fire warnings came today from the forest service as the weather bureau forecast continued high temperatures for the Pacific Northwest.

H. L. Plumb, Snoqualmie national forest supervisor, said a series of small fires has been brought under control on the east slopes of the Cascades. All were man-made and caused by carelessness, he said.

Although no 100-degree readings were reported, temperatures ranged generally in the 90's and high 80's.

The Dalles, Ore., missed the century mark by one degree—99—for the second straight day. Yakima had a 97, Walla Walla and Ephrata 95, Olympia 93 and Ellensburg 92.

Portland also recorded a 92 with Pendleton a degree lower.

Seattle's 89 upturn and 89 at Boeing field was the highest June 7 in history. The previous high for the day was 85.

Other peaks include: Spokane 89, Tacoma 88, Baker, Ore., 87, Roseburg, Ore., 84, Hoquiam 83, Eugene, Ore., 81, Port Angeles 80.

The weather bureau held no hope for relief today in eastern portions of Washington and Oregon. The west side of the two states may have it "slightly cooler" in the afternoon.

1st Movie Kiss 52 Years Ago

HOLLYWOOD, June 8 (AP)—The nation's capital observers Monday — the 52nd anniversary of the first screen kiss.

Back in 1896 the first pursed lips and smothered sighs were recorded on celluloid by May Irwin and John C. Rice. It was in a peep show called "The Widow Jones."

Actually, it wasn't a kiss, judged by today's standards. Today it would be classified as a near kiss. Still, it created a stir and a demand for censorship. The censors denounced it as a "lyric of the stockyards."

It set attendance records, and paved the way for more advanced techniques.

1100 Homes Hit By Big Flood

SPOKANE, June 8 (AP)—Early estimates indicate more than 1100 homes were damaged in the flooded areas of Eastern Washington, Idaho and Montana, the Red Cross said today in announcing the arrival of a building expert to assist in the reconstruction.

The weekly grain report said "excellent" progress has been made in getting the crop seeded.

State Grange Meets Today

ASTORIA, June 8 (AP)—The 75th annual Oregon state grange convention will nominate officers today and hear Oregon State college Dean William A. Schoenfeld.

Morton Tompkins, state grange master, told the opening assembly yesterday that the organization should work to defeat amendments to the state hydroelectric commission act. He said it was a "special interest grab against our natural resources."

"Under the changed law, a power company may issue securities against new dams, never retire or repay these, and may compel rate payers to pay interest on them indefinitely," Tompkins said.

The amendments are to be on the general election ballot in November. He said the changes would permit firms such as the Idaho Power company to delay construction of the proposed Hell's Canyon dam on the Snake. He said this would "keep public power out of Eastern Oregon."

He said the Idaho firm planned a small dam at Oxbow instead of the Hell's canyon project. Tompkins urged Willamette valley projects for irrigation and flood control benefits, protested dumping of raw sewage in the Willamette and asked support of a timber severance tax of 25 cents a thousand feet for reforestation and state advisory aid for each county.

Navy Schools Open For June Roster

John U. Marsh, navy recruiter, announced today that all navy schools listed under the navy's high school graduate training program are wide open for the month of June.

In this program a high school graduate may select his school before he enlists. Marsh advises young men to get their names in early as this program may not remain open long.

Stumps Prove To Be Lumber Source

ASTORIA, Ore., June 8 (AP)—Stumps long considered useless are now being made into spruce veneer here.

Stumps, cut into blocks, are producing 3000 feet of wood a day for the Uptegrove Lumber company—8 per cent of its daily cut.

A seaside logger, Ben Olson, tried harvesting the stumps as an experiment project. He cuts two or four blocks from each stump, hoists the blocks with a tractor, and brings them in to the mill.

Stumps as old as eight years still produce usable wood, he said.
