A tour of Butte Valley soil and water conservation practices will be made by soil men of the district and visitors starting at the district office in Macdoel at 9:30 a. m. Wednesday.

The first stop will be on the W. G. Osborne property where a land leveling demonstration will be given. From there the group will go to the field north of Ed Pieratt's farm for a tillage and weed control demonstration.

Lunch will be served at the Macdoel hotel followed by a visit to the Merle Goode ranch for a view of demonstrational seedings of perennial dryland grasses. A view of crested wheat grass seedings on government land four miles north of Macdoel will complete the field day.

**Saturday, June 13, 1925**—FOR SALE—Ford touring with starter; also Ford Bug. Best buy in town.

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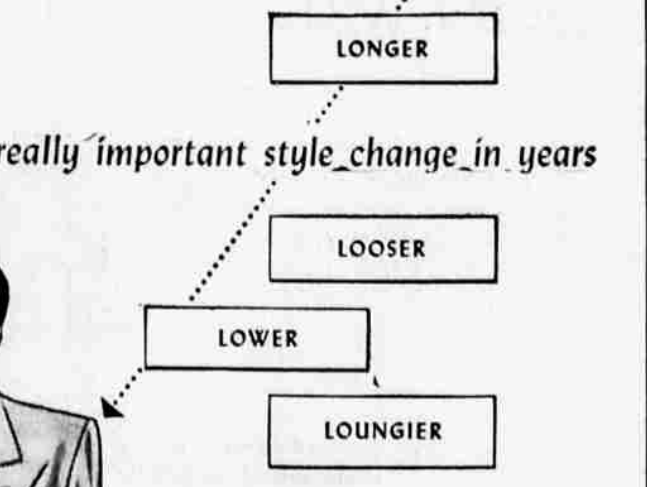
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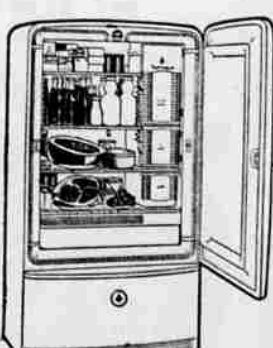
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
