

Band Assured Of Portland Festival Trip

Klamath Union high school's band was virtually assured its Portland Rose Festival trip today with donations coming in from individuals and a number of Klamath Falls firms.

Andy Loney Jr., director of music education in the city schools, is accompanying the band north as is John McManus, Margaret Stevenson, music director at Fairview and Fremont schools, will chaperone girl members of the band.

The entire group will leave at 6:30 a. m. Thursday by bus, returning Sunday at 8 a. m.

Due to flood conditions in the north, the band will not be accommodated as planned at Lewis and Clark college, but Loney received word yesterday that housing for the group was available at Hill Military academy. It will cost 50 cents a day more for each student under the new arrangement and this means that slightly more money is needed beyond the original \$1750 budgeted for the trip. Only breakfast will be available at the academy and meals will be more expensive.

715 On List Of 'Missing' From Vanport

PORTLAND, June 8 (AP)—The Red Cross Monday released a list of 715 individuals and families who have not been located in response to inquiries about their safety from the Vanport disaster.

The Red Cross emphasized it was not a list of "missing." Officials said many of them are safe but have not

registered with the Red Cross; some probably weren't even living in Vanport.

The Red Cross has located about 17,000 persons who fled from Vanport when that housing project city of 18,700 people was destroyed by a Memorial Day flood.

Today's list includes everyone about whom the Red Cross has received an "is he safe" inquiry and who has not registered with the disaster headquarters.

Many of the inquirers, in far distant states, asked about people who may not have been even living in Vanport at the time of the flood.

"We expect this list to be cut in half within 24 hours, as soon as people see names on it and come in to register with us," a Red Cross official said.

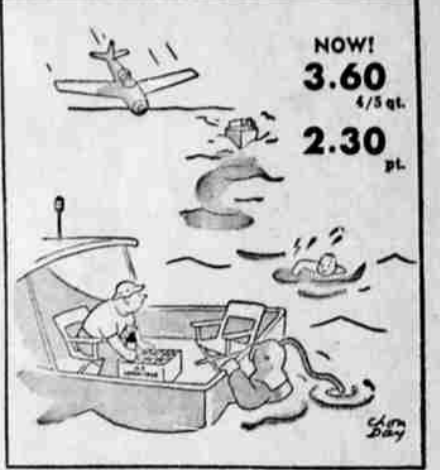

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Explorer Asks Native Name For Mountain

WASHINGTON, June 7 (AP)—A recommendation to give a high pass on Mount McKinley a name that has been suggested for the mountain itself reached the U. S. board on geographic names Monday.

Many Alaskans have urged that McKinley, highest peak in North America, be given back its native name, Denali.

The board said Explorer Bradford Washburn and others of his most recent mountain-climbing expedition have recommended that a beautiful snow-covered saddle 18,150 feet high, at the head of Harper glacier between McKinley's two highest peaks, be called Denali pass.

The board is considering 11 other Washburn proposals for place names in the Mount McKinley area. They include:

Brooks gap, 11,000-foot gap; McGonagall pass, 9800 feet, and Oastler pass, 5600 feet—all named for persons prominent in Alaska's mountaineering history.

Catche creek, Bagged peak, Silverthrone Col., Wedge peak, Central Pyramid peak, East Pyramid peak and West Pyramid peak.
