

Audience Pleased At Organ Concert

A very responsive and pleased audience heard the concert by the young and exceptionally gifted organist, Richard W. Elssasser, presented in the Zion Lutheran church Friday, June 4. The concert opened with three early works, Trumpet Rondo in B-Flat by John Bull, Le Fils (The Pifer) by Dandrieu, and Allegro Vivace by Saint-Saens. From the very beginning of the performance Mr. Elssasser had his audience captivated with his astounding facility and his exuberant driving vigor.

The second portion of the program included three modern works, Fire-side Sketches by Clokey, Soul of the Lake by Sigfrid Karg-Elert, and Concert Study in D Minor by Mr. Elssasser. The concert study contains over three thousand pedal notes to be played in approximately three minutes.

The third portion of the program was based on an improvisation, the theme for which had been submitted by Andrew Loney, director of music education in the public schools of Klamath Falls. This theme, an original composition of eight measures by Mr. Loney, was not seen beforehand by Mr. Elssasser until he was ready to improvise. The program closed with the improvisation, but at the insistence of the audience, Mr. Elssasser returned to the console to present The Children's Prayer from Handel and Gretel. The total impression of his concert is not one easily to be forgotten.

SWEDEN WANTS STEEL STOCKHOLM, (AP) — Sweden, one of the world's large shipbuilding nations, is facing a crisis because of an impending shortage of ship plates.

K. E. Jacobson, managing director of Goetaverken—builders of the new motorship "Stockholm"—said upon returning from the United States: "No money can get ship plates in the U. S."

Chances for Sweden to get ship plates in other countries—England, Belgium or Germany—were considered almost as slim, a spokesman for the Erikverken shipyards says. The recent trade agreement between

Sweden and the Bironia specified that Sweden will get 50,000 tons of rolled steel products in exchange for delivery of iron ore. How big a part of these products will be ship plates is still uncertain. Sweden's shipyards in 1947 launched over 50 merchant vessels, totalling 333,100 tons.

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
