

Prisoners Riot Over Food Lack

WALLA WALLA, June 9 (AP)—State penitentiary activities were back on a normal basis today, Warden Tom Smith said, after two prisoner uprisings within 24 hours.

Both were caused by food shortages and both were controlled without bodily violence.

First of the two disturbances occurred Sunday night when a shortage of cookies caused a small number of prisoners to throw dishes and other utensils during the evening meal.

Monday night, about 25 inmates rushed into the kitchen after one had thrown a bowl of potato salad at a guard in the dining room. Some of the equipment was smashed and food was spilled around the kitchen.

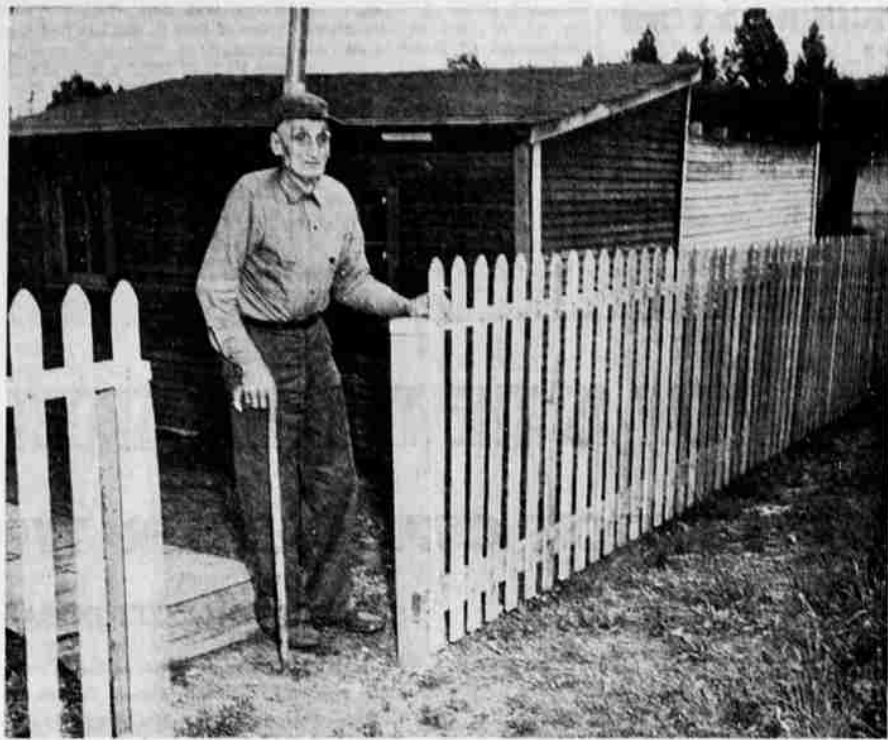
Smith said no other inmates joined the kitchen rioters after additional guards were called.

He said the trouble was caused by a shortage of meat and potatoes for the meal. Flood conditions in the Northwest have prevented normal rail and truck deliveries, the superintendent reported.

All prison activities were shut down after the Monday night disturbance, Smith said. Inmates were kept in their cells yesterday.

All activities, however, were resumed on a normal basis last night.

Blind Man Occupies Time With Building Fences

As long as he can keep occupied, whether at washing dishes or carpentry work, Hans Norman is happy. Norman who is 75 years old and totally blind has just completed a symmetrical three-foot high picket fence to divide the back yard at 1639 Alameda where he lives with his son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. M. D. Paup and children. He is finishing the gate this week. Working quickly and accurately he has built an extension on the garage making a compact storage shed

which he also used for a work shop. He has built a kitchen cabinet for his daughter, affixing the hinges and door catches neatly, covering the shelves with linoleum and topping the cabinet with metal so that hot utensils can be stored there.

The elderly man moves quickly and agilely about the premises, working without assistance except verification of his level by Norman Paup, his 11-year-old grandson. When the children are in school he does all the dishes and always repairs anything that needs it.

Norman was a coal miner most of his life in Boone, Ia., before he started to go blind. In the summers when there was no mining he did carpentry work and built a boat just before he moved to Klamath Falls, eight years ago. At that time he could still distinguish daylight and night, but about six months later he lost his sight entirely.
