

# Low Wallace Protests Truman Trip

PORTLAND, June 9 (AP)—Democratic gubernatorial nominee Low Wallace has no intention of holding the Truman band-wagon, but he agrees with some party leaders that the western tour is mishandled.

The Oregon party's national committeeman became involved in an anti-Truman dispute yesterday when William Ritchie, state chairman of Nebraska, announced contents of a letter received from the Oregon party leader.

Ritchie said Wallace had criticized Truman's trip. Wallace yesterday replied he had not been critical of Truman—is "100 per cent for the president"—but explained he had criticized mishandling of the trip by party aides.

Wallace said: "What I actually wrote: 'I am getting the same kind of run-around here and I think it is worse than what you are getting in Nebraska' because I am a candidate for governor. And, while I realize the niceties of treating the state officials properly, the governor and secretary of state are absent and the acting governor, who is being kowtowed to, is the outgoing state treasurer and one of the principal owners of The Oregonian, the republican paper which has already sharpened its knife to cut Truman's throat."

Wallace added that all he wanted was for the people to see the president, especially the children. He said there was no reason the president could not also see ranking party aides in the western states.

## Soldier Killed By Lieutenant

NUERNBERG, Germany, June 9 (AP)—U. S. army officials investigated Tuesday the fatal shooting of an American soldier by an army lieutenant.

The provost marshal's office said Pvt. Ralph J. Light, Myerstown, Pa., was shot to death last Saturday night.

No charges have yet been preferred and the lieutenant was released to his commanding officer pending completion of the investigation.

Officials said the shooting occurred after Light slapped the officer's wife and called her insulting names.

## On Aircraft Carrier



Edward L. Barrett, seaman apprentice, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Barrett, of route 3, Klamath Falls, is serving aboard the aircraft carrier USS Rendova which is on a world cruise. The aircraft carrier USS Rendova departed on April 1, from San Francisco, to deliver United States planes to the Turkish government. It will continue through the Suez canal, visiting Aden, Bahrain, Arabia, Colombo, Ceylon; Singapore; Manila and Honolulu, completing its world cruise in July at San Diego. Named after Rendova island in the Solomon islands, the aircraft carrier is commanded by Capt. T. R. Frederick, USN. It is a Commencement-Bay class ship, displacing 22,500 tons.

## Sears-Roebuck Sales Show Gain

CHICAGO, June 9 (AP)—Sears Roebuck and company, mail order firm, reported Tuesday its sales for May totaled \$193,326,805. This is an increase of 12.7 per cent over the \$171,561,594 grossed in May, 1947.

For the first four months of the company's fiscal year, February through May, the cumulative total was \$731,754,631. This is 22.3 per cent above the \$598,568,782 sold in the comparable period a year ago.

# Broad Flood Relief Asked

WASHINGTON, June 9 (AP)—An Idaho senator is urging that flood relief legislation for the Northwest be made broad enough to aid irrigation and drainage districts whose dikes and canals were damaged.

Senator Dworshak (R-Ida.) said he made that recommendation yesterday at a meeting of senate members from Northwest states, presided over by Senator Cordon (D-Ore.). Discussion at the senate group's meeting centered on a \$20,000,000 appropriation proposed for reconstruction of public utilities, including housing.

At the same time house members from the Northwest met separately with Rep. Angell (R-Ore.) presiding. Angell said the house members discussed immediate and stop-gap housing needs and provision for permanent dwellings to replace public housing destroyed by floods.

George H. Field, commissioner of the bureau of community facilities of the federal works administration, gave both groups a report on his personal inspection of the flooded areas.

# Archers Turn Out For Shoot

Spectators lined up Monday evening at the Altamont school grounds to watch a group of archers trying their skill.

Around 18 men, teachers, business men, students and merchants participated in the shooting using bobbing balloons as well as stationary targets for shooting marks. From 42 to 72-pound bows were used and many of the men were equipped with the approved three-finger glove and left arm bracer for protection.

The purpose of the shoot was to find out if there is enough interest in archery to organize a group in Klamath Falls for recreation and to improve skill for deer hunting.

At present the group calls itself the Basin Archers with Cecil Green Jr. as temporary president and Roy Ruge as temporary chairman. There will be another shoot at Altamont school grounds at 2 p. m. Sunday and a meeting at 2434 S. 6th at 6:30 p. m. next Tuesday. Any one interested is cordially invited to attend.

## Vanport Site Asked For Airport

PORTLAND, June 9 (AP)—A move is under way to convert the flood smashed Vanport area into an auxiliary municipal airport for flying businessmen and tourists.

The city aviation commission has been asked by Chairman Roy Owen to consider the proposal. He explained the mile square property is not likely to be considered prime industrial site property—as it was before the flood—and that it is centrally located between Portland and Vancouver.

Navy plans to establish a naval air reserve training program in Portland are being studied, the commission reports. The navy wants to use a part of the Portland-Columbia airport.

## Truman To Give Flood Report

PORTLAND, June 9 (AP)—The Civic auditorium will be opened to the public when President Truman addresses the nation by radio Friday after his tour of the Columbia river flood zone.

The president will give a 10-minute flood report at 1 p. m. The Red Cross said the auditorium will be opened at 11:30 a. m. and the doors closed at 12:45 p. m., shortly before the president arrives.
