

HST Lays Off Attack On Congress To Fly Over Area Of Flood; But More Coming

 OLYMPIA, June 11 (AP)—President Truman recessed his bombardment of congress temporarily today to fly over the Columbia river flood area but said he would keep "pouring it on" until the November election.

His face flushed from campaigning by open car and his voice a trifle husky, the chief executive said he would carry his case from one end of the country to the other and added:

"Then, if you people want to continue the policies of the 80th congress, that will be your funeral."

He made this statement last night before a crowd at Olympia's Syl-

vester park at the end of a strenuous automobile tour in which he blamed congress for high prices, the housing shortage and lack of interest in labor's welfare.

In off-the-cuff talks at Bremerton, Tacoma and Olympia and in his formal speech at Seattle, the president:

Called congress a "special interest congress."

Told the voters they should not be "suckers" for a congress which will be "a disgrace to this country" if it fails to vote price, housing and labor welfare laws.

Said a lot of congressmen were listening "to the greatest gathering of lobbyists in Washington that has ever been formed in this country."

The president conferred with Major General Philip B. Fleming, federal works administrator, and Secretary of Interior Krug on coordinated federal efforts to help relieve distress.

As they met at the executive mansion of Gov. Mon C. Wallgren preparatory to the inspection from the president's DC-6, the "Independence," Northwest rivers claimed another life and sent more hundreds from their homes in the multi-million dollar rampage.

The president planned to leave Olympia at 10:30 a. m. (EST) for McChord field to board the Independence. He will fly to Salem, Ore., and drive north to Portland for a speech for the Red Cross at 3 p. m. (EST).

Afterwards he will reboard his special train for Berkeley, Calif., where he will make a major foreign policy address at the University of California Saturday afternoon.

Mr. Truman expressed deep regret last night that his engagement at Berkeley would prevent his attending the funeral of Secretary of Labor Schwelienbach, set for Seattle, also on Saturday afternoon.

He designated Secretary Krug as his personal representative. Gov. Wallgren will accompany Krug to Seattle.

The president's staff indicated he would continue his criticism of congress at train stops along the way to Berkeley. "I have been pouring it on them pretty heavy here lately," the chief executive said at Olympia last night. "Maybe they will take the hint and do something. I would be very happy if they would do that. Of course, it would make a much better campaign if they don't."

His staff said he also would press his claim that congress passed a "rich man's tax law" over his veto.

Dr. Gilman has made several trips here in the interest of the proposed hospital.

USDA Buys Up Surplus Spuds

WASHINGTON, June 11 (AP)—The agriculture department reported Wednesday it has bought upwards of 700,000 bushels of surplus 1948-crop potatoes to support prices.

The bulk have been bought in Alabama, California and North Carolina. Government buying in Virginia is expected to start later this month.

Officials said prices paid have averaged about \$1 a bushel.

They said most of the government potatoes have been of low grades and are being sold for livestock feed and for manufacture into alcohol. Better grades are being turned over to public institutions and school lunch programs.
