PLAQUE FOR ROOSEVELT
LONDON, (AP)—Plans for a plaque which will make Franklin D. Roosevelt the first head of a foreign state ever honored by a niche in Westminster Abbey are to be executed by Sculptor H. W. Palliser. The design by C. Terry Pledge, ministry of works architect, will be an American eagle carved out of Hopton Wood stone, a form of marble. The carved inscription in Roman lettering, which was suggested jointly by Winston Churchill and Prime Minister Attlee, is still a secret. The Roosevelt niche, the last remaining on the Abbey walls, stands above the roll of honor of civilian casualties in the last war, in a section between the great west door and St. George's chapel.
