

Regatta All Set To Roll On Sunday

The Jaycee boat regatta is all set to go, the queen has been announced, the boat show is under way and the water program all lined up for Sunday on Upper Klamath lake.

Queen Beverly Young and her royal court will meet at the courthouse at 12 noon Sunday and be driven through town in open cars before the show starts on the lake at 1 p. m.

Ballboat races will start at 1 p. m. for the stretch around the island while other events are taking place. A measured one-mile oval will be the course for the speed boats.

Awards offered in the events are: \$60 first place; \$40, second place; \$30, third place, and \$20 in fourth place.

Members of the Junior chamber of commerce, sponsoring the regatta, will be in charge of refreshment stands, pickup and crash boats. The Jaycees will also furnish the timer, starter, scorer and referee.

The Oregon Outboard association will manage the speed boat events, which will start at 1 p. m. with the C service hydroplanes in the first heat.

Intermission will be filled with special entertainment including the log-bucking contests offering valuable awards.

Survey Set For Lakeview

LAKEVIEW, June 11 (AP)—A consulting engineer from Portland has been employed by the town of Lakeview to determine the capacity of the Lakeview sewage disposal plant, and he is expected here next week to make his survey.

The survey is needed as the north section of Lakeview has petitioned the council for a vote to float bonds for installing sewers there. If the present plant will not carry the additional load, it would be necessary to bond for construction of an additional plant or to enlarge the present one.

The engineer is John Gearhart, associated with Stevens and Koon, consulting engineers who designed the present Lakeview plant.

Police Investigate Mystery Death

PORTLAND, June 11 (AP)—The fate of Albert Johnson, 68, who was seriously injured last Saturday and dragged into a parking lot to die, was under police investigation today.

Johnson died in a hospital yesterday. Marks indicated he had been hurt in the street, and dragged 180 feet to concealment.

Police were not certain whether he had been struck by a car or beaten.

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., June 11 (AP)—Harvard university conferred the honorary degree of doctor of laws Thursday on Tygve Lie, secretary-general of the United Nations.

Paul G. Hoffman, director of the U. S. economic corporation administration, and Oswald Aranha, Brazilian statesman, were similarly honored at the university's 297th commencement.

Ten others representing leadership in education, religion, the arts, science and public service also received honorary awards.

University President James B. Conant cited Lie as "an effective official responsible to all mankind."

Fire Razes Planes At Rosecrans

ST. JOSEPH, Mo., June 11 (AP)—A large hangar, 21 airplanes and a mess hall used by the national guard were destroyed by fire Thursday at nearby Rosecrans field.

Hugh Middaugh, airport manager, estimated the loss tentatively at \$875,000 pending a more complete check.

One fireman was overcome by smoke while fighting the blaze.

It was the second disastrous fire at the field in a year and left the airport with only two hangars, a national guard structure. Damage estimated at \$1,400,000 was caused in a fire last July.

Rev. Leisy Rites Slated Saturday

DALLAS, June 11 (AP)—Funeral services will be held here at 3 p. m. tomorrow for the Rev. Homer Leisy, 33, past president of the Pacific district conference of the Grace Methodist church.

He died in a Salem hospital yesterday.

The services will be in the Dallas Grace church, where he had been pastor for nine years. Burial will be at Pratum.

The widow and two daughters survive.

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Civic Minded Doe Visits In Altamont Area

Apparently longing for a taste of city life after years in the wide open spaces, a male deer doe and her fawn paid the Altamont district a visit Thursday, creating quite a stir in that suburb.

The civic-minded animal and her offspring were first seen early Thursday morning by Pat McFadyen, 3087 Summers lane, who said the two were in his front yard when he went to work. That was 5:30 a. m.

The deer was seen by a number of residents of the area during the day, but first definite word came from Mrs. H. R. Tatman, of Denver avenue, who said she and her family saw the deer, sans fawn, cavorting about in William Gansung's pasture, just back of the Tatman property, about 4:30 p. m. Mrs. Tatman said the animal ran about in the pasture for some time and seemed to be rather bewildered by the whole thing.

A Herald and News photographer and reporter were dispatched to the scene of activity shortly after Mrs. Tatman's call, but failed to find anything but tracks.

Children playing in the Altamont school yard reported that the doe, this time with her youngster, wandered into the school grounds about 5 p. m.

Altamont citizens are wondering if their wilderness neighbor is planning to take up permanent residence in the area, with, undoubtedly, their carefully-tended gardens in view.

General opinion has it that the pair probably strayed down from the Hogback mountain area. The doe was reportedly large and appeared to be well fed.

House Trailers To Go To Vanport

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., June 11 (AP)—Loaded Thursday and ready for a fast trip to Portland, Ore., for use by flood victims were 100 house trailers from the Kelly Courts housing project here.

The trailers, two on each of 50 flatcars, will roll out tonight on the Southern Pacific railroad under orders that will get them to their destination in five days.

Call for the trailers came from the federal works agency at Seattle to the local FWA office.

Authority to take over the trailers was given to the local agency last Friday by the public housing administration and war assets administration.
