

Redbird Soph Finds Range To Top Giants

Nippy Jones Hot As Cards Surge Toward Loop Lead

Quick now, who is the regular first baseman of the St. Louis Cardinals?

The average baseball fan probably has to think twice before answering "Nippy Jones," but the 24-year-old sophomore is finding it in his colors, but efficient way is doing a bang-up job for Manager Eddie Dyer.

In the Cards' last nine games with Brooklyn, Philadelphia and New York, Jones has wrecked enemy pitching for 17 hits in 38 times at bat. He's driven in 17 runs and boosted his season mark 41 points to a respectable 311.

Jones collected three hits last night to help the Cards defeat the Giants, 11-8. The victory moved the Redbirds to within a half game of the first place Brooklyn Dodgers, who were defeated by the Reds in Cincinnati, 4-3.

Cincinnati had to go 11 innings to defeat the Dodgers. Three successive singles by Peanuts Lowrey, Grady Hatton and Walker Cooper furnished the winning run after two were out. Ewell Blackwell, pitching two and a third innings of relief, received credit for his first victory of the season.

A trio of homers by Herman Reich, Hank Sauer and Pitcher Dewey Adkins helped the last place Chicago Cubs outlast the Boston Braves, 9-8. Bob Muncie, one of the 10 pitchers used in the game was credited with his first victory as a Cub.

RESTLETT HITS

Dino Restelli, rookie Pittsburgh outfielder, celebrated the end of his first week in the majors by blasting two homers—his fourth and fifth—to lead the Pirates to a 12-3 triumph over Robin Roberts and the Philadelphia Phillies. Vic Lombardi went all the way to notch his first victory of the season.

The Detroit Tigers regained second place from the Philadelphia Athletics, defeating the Red Sox in Boston, 13-4, while the A's were bowing to the Cleveland Indians in a 14-inning thriller, 7-3. The triumph, coupled with New York's split in its doubleheader with the St. Louis Browns, left the Tigers four games behind the front-running Yankees.

The Yankees received a scare from the cellar-dwelling Browns who whipped them, 5-1, in the opener. However, the Yankees came back to outscore the Browns, 10-8, in the nightcap. In the other American league game, the Chicago White Sox, behind the steady hurling of Southpaw Bill Wight, defeated the Senators in Washington, 4-1.

The Tigers blasted four Boston pitchers for 18 hits, good for 28 bases. Johnny Ligon got four, and Paul Campbell and Vic Wertz got three apiece.

RASCHI SHELLED

The Browns came within an eye lash of winning a doubleheader from the Yankees. They knocked out Vic Raschi, belaboring the ace righthander with 13 hits in less than six innings of the nightcap, but Tommy Henrich's 14th homer in the last of the sixth, with one man aboard broke up an 8-8 tie.

Dale Mitchell's triple with the bases loaded broke at 3-3 tie and gave the Indians a 14-inning triumph over the A's. The win moved the Tribe into fourth place past the Red Sox. Bob Lemon, who replaced starter Gene Bearden in the eighth allowed one run in seven innings to receive credit for his seventh victory. Carl Schreih was the loser.

PORTLAND, June 23 (AP)—The Portland Beavers have bought Japhet (Red) Lynn, veteran right-handed pitcher, for an undisclosed price from the Los Angeles Angels.
