WESTERN OREGON—Considerable fog and low clouds along coast today and Friday. Fair interior extreme south portion today, otherwise cloudy this morning and clear this afternoon. Increasing cloudiness tonight and Friday with showers Friday afternoon. Slightly warmer today but cooler Friday. High 80 in 65 on coast both days and 75 to 85 interior today and 80 to 75 Friday. Low tonight 46 to 54. Northwest winds 15 to 25 miles an hour of coast.

NEW YORK, June 23 (AP)—A fire broke out in the third balcony of the Metropolitan opera house last night and caused damage estimated at \$10,000.

The Met is closed for the summer. The blaze wrecked a third balcony partition before it was put out. About 50 seats were ripped out. Part of the Met's famous red plush carpet was ruined.

The fire marshal's office began an inquiry into cause of the fire.

Television Relay Station Gets OK

ASTORIA, June 23 (AP)—Permission to build a television relay station here has been granted to Edward Parsons, manager of radio station KAST, by the city council. The station would relay signals from Seattle telecasts.

The city also authorized KAST to use property along Young's bay when it increases power from 250 to 1000 watts. KAST has asked the federal communications commission for the power boost.

Tule Division Maps Available

The large comprehensive maps of the Tulelake division of the Klamath project, U. S. bureau of reclamation, have been reduced both in size and price.

Streamliner To Be Shown On July 7

The Southern Pacific Shasta Day-light streamliner, which will make two stops a day in Klamath Falls beginning July 10, will be previewed here July 7 from 9 a. m. till 11:30 a. m. Harry Fee, SP district freight and passenger agent, announced Wednesday.

The new train will take the place of the Beaver, Fee said, although the Cascade will continue on its present schedule.

The Klamath County chamber of commerce will sponsor a breakfast in the Winema hotel the morning of July 7 is part of the program to welcome the new train service.

Two San Francisco SP officials will be on hand for the Klamath Falls preview of the Shasta Day-light streamliner. They are C. E. Peterson, vice president in charge of passenger traffic, and C. O. Olsen, assistant general passenger agent.

Starting July 10, the new train will start its Portland to San Francisco run. The northbound train will leave Klamath Falls 4:41 p. m., the southbound train leaving the city 2:23 p. m.

Fee said that those who tour the train during its stay here July 7 will be impressed with the tavern car, which simulates a Swiss chalet and is similar to the inside of Mt. Hood lodge.

In addition to the breakfast, the chamber will also arrange for a program to supplement the preview of the new train.

The train is powered with a 6000 h.p. diesel-electric locomotive. It has a 15-car total, with a passenger capacity of 442. The train includes one baggage postal car, nine chair cars, one parlor observation car, one tavern car, coffee shop, kitchen and dining car.

Pasteurizing Rig Installed Here

The Klamath Falls creamery has installed a "Vacterator," latest type of pasteurizing machine, bringing it up to par with any modern plant in the country.

The continuous vacuum pasteurizer, or Vacterator, was developed in New Zealand to bring quality of butter and other dairy products up to compete with finest world markets.

Stainless steel throughout, the machine can be kept spotless to pasteurize milk and cream under a partial vacuum, preserving flavor and valuable food qualities.

Spencer Creek Fire Reported

The first fire this week on Klamath Forest Protective association land was reported Thursday morning on the west side, near the Spencer ranch on the Ashland highway. A crew was dispatched immediately, and controlled and mopped up the blaze.

Boat Show Slated For KF Showing To Boost Regatta

Seven boats and motors in addition to other boating and fishing equipment, ladies sports wear and other displays will be on exhibit at the boat show in Balsiger's show room at Main and Esplanade, Friday and Saturday evenings.

The boat show is being held in conjunction with the annual boat regatta, which will come off Sunday on Upper Klamath lake. An added attraction to the boat and equipment show will be a racing boat owned by Joe Roads of 821 Oak. Roads has been racing boats up and down the coast for 12 years, and has won more than his share of trophies and championships. Boats identical to Roads' will be featured in the regatta Sunday.

Lehman Picked As Successor For Wagner

NEW YORK, June 23 (AP)—New York state's liberal party, figuring that U. S. Senator Robert F. Wagner will resign soon because of illness, is backing former Governor Herbert H. Lehman for the post.

Selection of the democratic ex-governor by the liberal party's policy committee was announced last night by State Chairman Adolf A. Berle Jr.

Lehman, former director general of the United Nations relief and rehabilitation administration, was endorsed on the basis of "his record, his character and his long service both to labor and liberal measures."

Lehman also has many backers in democratic ranks as a successor to Wagner.

Wagner, New York's 72-year-old senior senator, has not answered a senate roll call since 1947.

Rain Aids Crops, But More Needed

PORTLAND, June 23 (AP)—The welcome rain that fell Sunday improved Western Oregon's crops, but wasn't enough to ease the Eastern Oregon drought, the weather bureau reported today.

The weekly crop-weather bulletin said all grains in the Columbia valley still need rain badly—with spring grains suffering most.

Western Oregon crops were doing better, however. Both the harvest of canner peas and of strawberries in the Willamette valley were reported below average; but other crops were progressing well.

Disbursing Office May Be Moved

PORTLAND, June 23 (AP)—Seattle soon may get the region disbursing office of the federal treasury.

The office, now located in the federal courthouse here, may have to move if congress approves a proposal for appointment of a third federal judge for the Oregon district.

A. O. Wahlers, head of the office, said he understood his space in the courthouse would be taken over for the judge. Seattle was mentioned as the likely new headquarters.

The office, which has 36 full-time employees handles checks for federal departments and bureaus in this area.

Plans for the art fair to be held Saturday are completed. Exhibit Chairman Vern Swanson announced today.
