

# Governors Line Up For Senate Race

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., June 23 (AP)—A crop of senatorial candidates appeared to be sprouting today as the nation's governors ended their 41st annual conference.

At least three members—including the new conference chairman, Kansas republican Gov. Frank Carlson—are being counted here as probable entrants in next year's senate races.

Pennsylvania's republican Gov. James H. Duff and Colorado's democratic Gov. Lee Knous are linked with Carlson as likely candidates.

But nobody professed to know anything about the future plans of New York's Gov. Thomas E. Dewey,

the 1948 GOP presidential nominee. Best bet was that if Dewey runs again at all, it will be for re-election as governor next year.

Dewey's running mate on last year's ticket, California's Gov. Earl Warren, is being listed as almost certain to seek re-election.

None of the three governors, however, would admit publicly that they are eyeing the senate. All took active parts in the three days of conference debates which ended with passage of a series of resolutions.

In one of these, the governors gave a general endorsement to the administration's foreign policies, including support of the United Nations, the European recovery program and the North Atlantic pact.

The resolution's call for senate action "to implement the pact and to give it full force and effect" generally was regarded as indirect approval of the proposed \$1,130,000,000 program to rearm Western Europe.

In their final action, the governors ignored a special committee which met with congress members last year and urged a 20 per cent cut in

federal aid grants in return for the government's vacating some tax fields.

Indiana's democratic Gov. Henry P. Schricker, who headed the resolutions committee, said the governors just weren't "in the position where they can turn down federal aid."

Instead, the conference reaffirmed a resolution it adopted in 1944 calling for "all levels of government" to "participate financially" in unemployment, relief and other matters.

With its unanimous vote rule in effect, the conference killed a proposal by Georgia's democratic Gov. Herman Talmadge, supported by Louisiana's democratic Gov. Earl K. Long, calling for distribution of all federal aid to states purely on the basis of need.

Besides Carlson, the conference named three republican governors on its executive committee. They were Govs. Fred G. Andahl of North Dakota, Duff of Pennsylvania and Douglas McKay of Oregon.

Democrats named were Govs. Beauford H. Jester of Texas, Knous

of Colorado and Adlai E. Stevenson of Illinois.
