## Christian Science Topic Set

Topic of this Sunday's lesson-  
sermon at the First Church of Christ,  
Scientist, Tenth and Washington,  
will be "Christian Science."

Divine worship services are held  
at 11 a. m. each Sunday, with Sun-  
day school classes downstairs in the  
church at the same time.

A weekly meeting is held Wednes-  
days at 8 p. m. and a freed reading  
room is maintained at 1023 Main  
street.

Golden Text will be, "Ho, every-  
one that thirsteth, come ye to the  
waters, and that hath no money;  
come ye, buy, and eat: yea, come,  
buy wine and milk without money  
and without price" (Isa. 55:1).  
Among other citations in the  
lesson-sermon will be the following  
from Revelations 10: 1, 2, "And I  
saw another mighty angel come  
down from heaven, clothed with a  
cloud: And he had in his hand a  
little book open." From "Science  
and Health With Key to the Scrip-  
tures" by Mary Baker Eddy, found-  
er of Christian Science will be the  
correlative passage, "This angel or  
message which comes from God,  
clothed with a cloud, prefigures di-  
vine Science."

## Methodist Rites Short

There will be a "Unified Service"  
beginning at 10 o'clock Sunday  
morning at the First Methodist  
church, June 26. The worship ser-  
vice and the Sunday school session
