

Flying Cards Assume Lead Over Dodgers

Than Lou Klein Hits Two Homers In Keynote Match

The St. Louis Cardinals, by the grace of baseball commissioner A. B. (Happy) Chandler, occupied first place in the National league today.

The high-flying Redbirds, sparked by the addition of the recently reinstated Lou Klein, defeated the Boston Braves, 8-4, last night, to wrest first place from the Brooklyn Dodgers.

The victory, coupled with Pittsburgh's 4-2 triumph over Brooklyn, enabled the Cardinals to take a half-game lead over the Dodgers. The Braves had held the lead for 18 consecutive days.

Two home runs by Klein, who along with other Mexican league jumpers, had his suspension lifted by Chandler early this month, played a very prominent role in the Cardinal victory.

Since Klein was taken over for the ally Marv Marion at shortstop, the Cards have won seven and lost two.

Besides fielding his position in line style, Klein has been coming through with some clutch hits to compile a creditable .281 batting average.

Ralph Kiner's first turning home run with two bases aboard—his 16th of the season—was enough to give the Pirates their victory over Brooklyn. Kiner's out-of-sight blow and his eighth-inning single were the only hits made by Pittsburgh.

PANCHO GONZALES FAILS IN WIMBLEDON SINGLES

LONDON, June 25 (AP)— Geoff Worthington of Australia upset Richard (Pancho) Gonzales of Los Angeles in the U. S. singles Wimbledon, 2-6, 6-3, 6-2, 6-1, in the titleholder tennis championships today. The victory moved Brown into the quarter finals.

As Gonzales advanced, defending champion Bob Falkenberg of Beverly Hills, Calif., and Frankie Parker of Los Angeles, former U. S. titleholder, moved into the quarter-finals with straight-set triumphs.

Falkenberg turned back Hans Van Swol of The Netherlands, 7-5, 6-0, 6-4, while Parker ousted George Gussie Moran of Australia, 6-2, 6-3, 6-1.

Rick Sturgess of South Africa, runner-up in the U. S. championships last year, moved into the round of eight by defeating Gianni Cucelli, the Italian Davis cup ace, 6-2, 6-4, 6-1.

Jaroslav Drobny of Czechoslovakia also became a quarter-finalist when he breezed through Nigel Cockburn of South Africa, 6-2, 6-3, 6-2.

POUGHKEEPSIE, N. Y., June 25 (AP)—Ky Ebright's California Bears Olympic champions and conquerors of mighty Washington, ruled the Poughkeepsie regatta today, heavy favorite that is, to everyone except Husky Coach Al Urickson.

Harrison Pursued

TORONTO, June 25 (AP)—Sixty-six golfers set out in pursuit of E. J. (Dutch) Harrison today in the final round of the Canadian open championship, but less than half a dozen had any hope of catching him.

The slow-talking, easy-playing pro from Little Rock, Ark., has knitted together three straight sub-par rounds of 66-67-71 for a 34-hole total of 204.

This gives him a three-stroke lead going into the final round of St. George's par 72 course.

The closest threat was Dick Metz, a veteran tournament picker from Virginia Beach, Va., who rang up his third straight 69, for a 201 total.

The defending champion, Charles (Chuck) Condon of Tacoma, Wash., was seven strokes off the pace with 211.

The defending Washington state pro provided the biggest thrill of yesterday's round with an eagle three on the ninth hole. Two tremendous wood shots left him only five feet from the hole for his easy putt.

Right Side This Time Cal McLish Pitches 7-4 Los Angeles Win

LOS ANGELES, June 25 (AP)—Cal McLish of the Los Angeles Angels has a decided advantage over other Pacific Coast league pitchers. When batters start giving him trouble, he just changes gloves and starts chinking with the other arm.

Theoretically, anyway, the Angels bought two pitchers for the price of one: McLish the right-hander and McLish the southpaw. His possibilities seem unlimited.

The ambidextrous newcomer made his second start Friday night with a 7 to 4 victory over the Seattle Rainiers. He pitched with his right side this time, yielding 10 hits and five walks.

The Angels are still at the bottom of the heap, but they now hold a 3 to 1 edge over Seattle in the series.

There were six stolen bases in the game—four for the Seals and two for the Rainiers. It was Dempsey's eighth win of the season.

San Diego made it two in a row over the league-leading Hollywood Stars with a 7 to 3 triumph. Lynn Lindo went the route for the Padres, giving up eight hits. The Stars hold a 3 to 2 edge in the series.

AUSTIN, Tex., June 25 (AP)—Men from the University of San Francisco were poised today for a grand slam in the national collegiate tennis tournament.

USF's Stan Match met Tulane's smooth-stroking Jack Tuero for the singles championship. This afternoon championship Sam will team with locomotive Art Larsen to battle Jim Frank and Fred Fisher of Washington for the doubles title.

San Francisco already has won the team championship. Match and Larsen made that possible yesterday as Sam took his semi-final engagement with Fred Kovalek of William and Mary, 6-2, 3-6, 6-0, 6-3, and then paired with tow-headed Larsen to crash through in doubles semifinals over Jack Turpin and Chick Harris, of Rice, 6-3, 11-13, 6-4, 6-2.

Match was seeded No. 3 in the tournament and Tuero No. 8.

SF Club Triumphs

FRESNO, Calif., June 25 (AP)—The nation's top track and field performers meet tonight in the national AAU championships.

Only two of the big timers will be missing. They are Mel Patton, USC's sprinter and Don Gehman, University of Wisconsin member.

Patton never intended to run here. Gehman withdrew yesterday. A hard duel is expected in the hurdles between Craig Dixon of UCLA and Harrison Dillard, a graduate of Baldwin Wallace, Ohio.

Dixon will compete for the Los Angeles Athletic club.

Dixon and about 50 others of the best trackmen in Southern California are favored to win the team title.

Jamaica's Herb McKenzie is the favorite in the 400 meter event, with Olympic Champion Mal Whitfield of Ohio State rated a sure winner in the 800 meter run.

The AAU junior track and field championships, run off last night, were won by the Olympic club of San Francisco with 12 1/2 points.

The longest race of the senior division, the 10,000 meters, was held last night, as a combined event with the juniors.

Fred Wilt, former University of Indiana distance star now competing for the New York Athletic club, won in the record time of 31:05.7. The mark he cracked had been set by another Indiana man, Don Lash, who leaped the distance in 31:06.9.

Wilt's win got the NYAC off to a good start in its defense of the senior team championship.

Needing only one victory to clinch the title, the Longhorns are expected to send Ace Murray Wall to the mound.

Wall pitched Texas to a 7-1 victory over St. John's of Brooklyn in the first round.

While the Texans sat in the grandstand, Wake Forest eliminated the defending champion, Southern California's Trojans, 2-1.

Duck Stamp Raise Okayed

WASHINGTON, June 25 (AP)—A senate-passed bill boosting the price of the annual duck stamp from \$1 to \$2 was approved yesterday by a house fisheries and wildlife subcommittee.

The bill also would permit federal public hunting on limited waterfowl refuges. It specified that not more than 25 per cent of any refuge acquired from now on by the fish and wildlife service may be open at any one time to shooting.

The subcommittee also okayed a bill providing that revenues from the 10 per cent federal tax on fishing rods, creels, reels, artificial lures, baits and flies be given to states to aid in fish restoration and management projects.

ASTORIA, Ore., June 25 (AP)—Defending Champion Lou Jennings of Portland goes up against co-Medalist Ron Clark of The Oregon Golf association tournament.

Jennings turned in a sparkling 4 and 3 victory over Tom Denhart, a fellow townsman, in yesterday's semi-finals. Clark, a University of Oregon student, won by an even more lopsided score as he eliminated former Champion Harold Salvador, Portland, 8 and 7.

In the women's division, Mrs. Lyle Bowman of Portland continued to hold her jinx over Grace De Moss, Corvallis, whom she ousted in 1946 and 1947.

Mrs. Bowman sidelined Miss De Moss 7 and 6 in the semi-finals and will meet Mrs. Lloyd Burgess, Astoria, today for the championship.

Burgess gained the title round with a 4 and 5 victory over Mrs. Charles Kindred, Corvallis.

Yales Crack Stream Mark

NEW LONDON, Conn., June 25 (AP)—Everyone who knew anything about crew racing said Harvard would win its 64th encounter with Yale but it didn't, in beating Harvard for the first time since 1935, Yale shattered the four mile upstream record on the lower Thames as well.

After the mile and half Yale was never headed, but neither was it out of danger. At no time did more than four or five feet separate the shells and, at the finish, the Blue was ahead by a slim third of a length.

Yale's winning time was 19 minutes 52.8 seconds. Harvard's 10:54.4. The record that was broken was set by Harvard in 1937 when it rowed the upstream course in 20:02.
