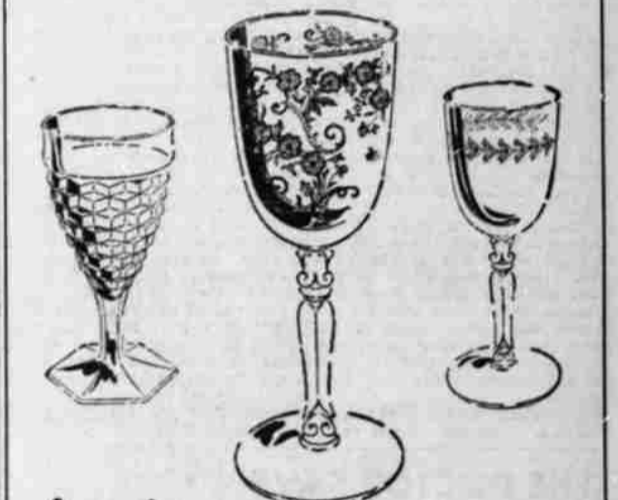
A formal dance was held following the installation. Friends, guests and members attended the party. Incoming Senior Princess Arlene Stanbery was chairman for the event.
