

Gems Powder Nuggets For Pair Of Wins

Klamath Extends Victory March To Five In Row

The Gems kept the fans out late last night, almost until midnight, but they managed to sweep a four-game series from the Medford Nuggets and extend their current winning streak to five games in a row.

In the Sunday nocturnal double-header Klamath Falls bopped the Far West league tail-enders 23-4 in the seven-inning first match, then won the nightcap 14-3 after trailing through the first half of the fray.

Saturday night Stan Gilson pitched the Gems to a 6-4 win. Chuck Schlemmer and Niles Jordan were the Sunday winners—Jordan taking his eighth victory.

The opener last night amounted to a symphony of base knocks, particularly for the Gems. Pinsky Hesse, Bob Cassell and Morris Nordell each had home runs, Nordell and Cassell getting them in the first frame with two on base each time to highlight a nine-run rally.

Chuck Chesire, Nuggets' second baseman, had a solo homer in the fourth and Hesse got his solo in the fifth to touch off another nine-run outburst.

GUELFO LOSER
Larry Guelfo started and was the loser. He walked the first three batters to face him and was relieved.

Jordan struck out 11 Nuggets in the full-length game and he and Lloyd Jones of Medford had a nice even match going until the Gems came to bat in the sixth inning trailing 5-3. Five runs came across that frame, the one that put Klamath ahead scoring when Medford Manager Danny Reagan threw wild to third base on a pickoff try.

The Gems batted around again in the seventh, scoring six times. Irv Whit, Klamath Falls boy who has been playing pro ball for three seasons, joined the Medford club just before game time and went in to pitch in that inning.

Ken Jensen had three hits in five bats to lead the Klamath hitting in that game. Mill Lindberg and Glen Gerbus each had three hits in five for the Nuggets.

Tonight the two teams go over to Medford to open a three-game stand there. The Gems will be back home Thursday.

WIMBLEDON, England, June 27 (AP)—America's mighty tennis phalanx faced another possible rupture today in quarter-final matches of the Wimbledon tennis championships.

Defending champion Bob Falkenberg of Hollywood, Calif., was conceded no better than an even chance against the wily John Bromwich, Australia's veteran two-handed stroking specialist.

The top-seeded Ten Schroeder of La Crosse, Calif., and third-ranked Frankie Parker of Los Angeles were expected to gain the round of four as scheduled.

Schroeder squared off against Frank Sedgman, young Australian champion, while Parker met Eric Sturges of South Africa.

The fourth quarter-final joust pitted Yugoslavia's Davis cup ace, Jaroslav Drobny, against Geoff Brown, the giant killer from down under.

It was Australia's Brown who fractured the seeded ranks Saturday by disposing of Richard (Pancho) Gonzalez, the United States amateur champion and second seeded performer, 2-5, 6-3, 6-2, 6-1.

Boston Inches Up As Pesky 'Sets Table'

Yanks Split Twin Bill With Detroit; Bums Still Lead

The Boston Red Sox are devouring everything in sight these days, largely because little Johnny Pesky once again is "setting the table" for slugger Ted Williams and Vern Stephens.

Pesky is the lad whose name you never see among the home run and runs-batted-in leaders, but year in and year out he's around the top in his runs scored and batting percentage.

In four years with the Sox, punting Pesky never has failed to tally at least 100 runs per season. In three of those he collected 200 or more hits and hit over 300.

Pesky got into a wobbly start this year and it was no coincidence that the Red Sox did the same. Johnny has hit safely in Boston's last 12 games scoring in all but two. The Red Sox have won 10 of them. Their 5-3 triumph yesterday over the St. Louis Browns was their fifth in a row and moved them into third place by two percentage points over Detroit.

Pesky has been a ball of fire during that stretch. He's banged out 22 hits in 50 times at bat for a .444 figure. He has pulled his average up 33 points to a respectable .301.

Boston now is only five games behind the league leading New York Yankees.

The Yankees were held to a split in their doubleheader with the Tigers. Ed Lopat ended a four-game losing streak, pitching the Yankees to a 6-2 triumph in the opener, but the Tigers came back to pound Vic Raschi and Frank Shea for a 12-4 second game win.

MULLIN HITS THREE
Pat Mullin, a bench-warmer practically all season, replaced the slumping Johnny Groch for Detroit, and slammed out three home runs in the nightcap. He hadn't connected for any before yesterday. The loss was the second for the 11-game winning Raschi, both at the hands of the Bengals.

Runner-up Philadelphia also divided a twin bill. The A's beat the Chicago White Sox, 4-2, on pinch hitter Wally Moses' three-run double in the eighth, but the Sox came back to win the second, 3-0.

Bob Kuzava and Martino Pieretti combined to spin the shutout.

A pair of walks, a single by Ken Kenedy and a double by Bob Kennedy gave Cleveland two runs in the 10th inning and a 3-1 verdict over the Senators in Washington. Steve Gromek edged out Sid Hudson in the hurling duel.

Brooklyn protected its half game edge over St. Louis in the National League, running roughshod over Pittsburgh, 15-3. A 10-run seventh inning broke up any semblance of a ball game. The second game of the doubleheader, delayed 42 minutes by rain, was called at the end of three innings because of Pennsylvania's Sunday Curfew. The Dodgers were ahead, 5-4, but all records are wiped off.

FIFTH FOR NEWCOMBE
Don Newcombe notched his fifth victory. The Cards kept pace with the Dodgers as Red Muzger shut out the Boston Braves, 2-0, with a four-hitter.

The Cincinnati Reds slowed up the one-rushing Philadelphia Phils, knocking them off in both ends of a doubleheader, 4-3 and 5-2. The Reds won the opener in the 10th when pinch hitter Homer Howell doubled Lloyd Merriman in from second. Herm Wehner gained his second victory in the nightcap.

Playing without Leo Durocher, their suspended manager, the New York Giants salvaged the final of a three-game series from the Chicago Cubs, 6-2.

California Crewmen Prove Skill In Boat Length Victory Over Washington

POUGHKEEPSIE, N. Y., June 27 (AP)—Any lingering doubts that California does not have the best crew in the country had been dispelled today—a result of its amply executed victory in the Poughkeepsie regatta.

Until Saturday's race, some coaches were undecided whether California or Washington should hold the top spot. Now, at least for another year, the picture has been cleared.

It was Al Ulbrickson, Washington coach, who said before the three-mile Hudson river grind, that the shell that could show strength in the last mile would be the one to win. His prediction came true, but he had an idea the order of finish in Saturday's race would be different.

Ulbrickson really thought he had the fastest finishing eight on the river. That's how he had been training his boys. When the Huskies whipped into the lead at the start, it looked as though they would take

the classic for the second straight year.

But Ky Ebright's confident Olympic champions of California had other ideas. They permitted Washington to open up daylight in the first two miles, but then raising their beat steadily until it hit 37, they pulled away in the final lap to win by about a boat length.

Washington in desperation, upped its beat to 37 at the end, too, but it was to no avail. The Californians had the staying power, and that told the story in the end.

Strung out behind the two leaders, in order: Cornell, Navy, Princeton, Penn, Wisconsin, Columbia, Syracuse, Stanford, M. I. T., and Rutgers.

Stork Sanford's Cornell shell, which went through a mediocre campaign, provided the big surprise in its third place finish, outlasting Navy and Princeton in a dogfight right down to the line.

Cornell also finished second in the freshman event, followed by Wisconsin, Princeton, Penn, M. I. T., Columbia, Navy and Syracuse. In the J. V. affair, following Washington across the finish marker were Navy, California, Penn, Princeton, Cornell, Syracuse, M. I. T. and Columbia.

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RASMUSSEN MOVES Oregon Ace On Select Team

FRESNO, Calif., June 27 (AP)—George Rasmussen, University of Oregon pole vaulter, will compete in Europe next month with other United States stars in track meets with Europeans.

Rasmussen was among the 64 men named for the trip. Generally, second or third in various events at the Amateur Athletic Union's track and field meet here Saturday.

Rasmussen tied for first place with Robert Richards of the Illinois Athletic club with a mark of 14 feet 4 inches.

Richards was named to an advance squad of 10 that will sail from New York July 5 for Portugal. The remaining 44 will leave New York July 21 for Oslo, where they will be joined by the contingent sent earlier to Portugal.

In the Norwegian capital the entire U. S. team will compete against stars of the Scandinavian countries, July 27-29. Then the group will split into units for competition in Sweden, Norway, Denmark, Finland, Holland, France, Switzerland, Greece, Belgium and possibly Ireland and Czechoslovakia.

Another University of Oregon performer, Dave Henthorne, finished fifth in the 100-meter dash, but was not named to the traveling squad. Both Henthorne and Rasmussen competed for the Multnomah Athletic club of Portland.

National Crown To Longhorns

WICHITA, Kas., June 27 (AP)—The University of Texas Longhorns today wore the championship crown of the national college baseball teams.

The Longhorns clinched the national collegiate athletic association championship Saturday by defeating Wake Forest 10-3. It gave the Texas team a record of three victories against no losses in the double elimination tournament.

Other teams participating were Southern California, 1948 champion, St. John's college (Brooklyn) and Wake Forest.

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
