Cars Hold Up Ambulance

TULELAKE, June 27 (AP)—Motorists who refused to yield to the siren of the Tulelake ambulance Sunday night when a critically injured man was being taken to a Klamath Falls hospital caused two delays, according to L. C. Longenecker, ambulance driver, and his assistant, Leslie Thaler.

The ambulance was en route from the scene of a fatal accident south of Tulelake. Between Merrill and Klamath Falls, the vehicle, being driven with siren open and red light on, was forced to stop twice when drivers failed to pull to the side of the highway as the ambulance met passing cars.

Longenecker, recently of Iowa, has taken over operation of the city ambulance and is on duty 24 hours a day. Ambulance calls may be placed at 2018, Tulelake.

Deer Killing Charge Filed

Two elderly Weyerhaeuser woods employes were jailed early this morning by state police on a charge of illegal possession of deer meat, and a freshly-killed doe was confiscated.

The two men, James Torrence Lowther, 62, and William Howard Johnson, 76, pleaded not guilty to the charge in justice court, and their bail was set at \$200 each. State police said they were located in a cabin on the Shelby ranch near Beatty early this morning, and the carcass of the deer was on the cabin floor.

Gerber and Mrs. Gerber were at Oriana corrals, across Horsefly mountain from the ranch, when the fire struck Saturday.

Plane Crash Injures Two

TILLAMOOK, June 27 (AP)—A Salem couple recovered here today from a narrow brush with death in a plane crash near Netarts.

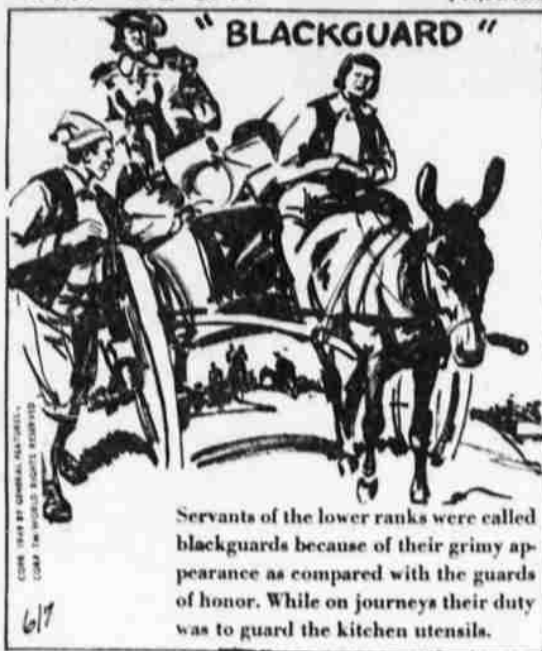
The light plane of George Oliver King, 40, and his wife, Sarah Gladys King, 35, was cruising over Netarts bay when the engine failed. The plane plummeted toward earth, and King tried to fight it into a glide. It side-slipped onto the mud flats, skidded and bounced 300 feet, throwing off parts as it went.

Walter Herd, Tillamook flier, landed twice near the scene to bring the Kings here, one at a time. They were hospitalized: King with a nose fracture, a sprained hip and cuts; Mrs. King with a skull fracture, back injuries and cuts.

The Kings, who came to Oregon recently from Indiana, had left Salem in mid-morning for their usual Sunday air jaunt. King was the pilot. He is employed at Salem as an electrician.
