

Atom Bomb Plan Asks Retaliation

WASHINGTON, June 28 (AP)—Senator Flanders (R-Vt.) said Monday he will ask congress to forbid use of the atomic bomb except as a weapon of "retaliation."

Flanders said the bomb, like biological warfare and poison gas, "is not properly a military device" but "rather a means for the mass murder of citizens."

He announced to a news conference that he has drafted a resolution for the senate and house which would state as a national policy that the United States will "not employ the atomic bomb as a weapon of warfare," but—

"Until satisfactory means of control are agreed upon and put into complete effect through the United Nations the armed services of this nation are directed to prepare themselves and to hold themselves in readiness to retaliate with overwhelming force against any nation which initiates the military use of atomic energy."

Flanders said the resolution has four major purposes:

1. Make it unnecessary to wait for the convening of congress and the declaration of war in case an atomic bomb is dropped on this country. Flanders says congress by approval of the resolution would call in advance for instant reprisals.
2. Set up a national policy for the guidance of the armed services.
3. Give reassurance to the people behind the iron curtain as to our purpose and plans as far as the atomic bomb is concerned should we be drawn into a war with their governments.
4. Give a new impetus to endeavors to reach an agreement in the United Nations on the use and control of atomic energy.

Housing Bill Backers Gain

WASHINGTON, June 28 (AP)—Backers of the administration's housing bill won an initial test in the house Monday. They beat 137 to 99 a proposed substitute containing no provisions for public housing.

Offered by Rep. Davis (D-Ga.), the beaten bill would have authorized \$350,000,000 for slum clearance and farm housing aids, but nothing for housing construction by the government.

The vote was a teller count—with the members not recorded by name. Still other proposed substitutes are to be considered. Administration leaders are confident they can beat them all.

Speaker Rayburn (R-Tex.) told President Truman that the house will pass "a pretty good bill."

Solon Makes CVA Debate Challenge

SEATTLE, June 28 (AP)—A challenge to Governor Arthur B. Langlie to debate publicly the merits of a Columbia valley administration was made Monday by Representative B. Mitchell.

In a telegram to Harold Tipton, executive secretary for the league for CVA, Mitchell said he was certain a satisfactory time and place for the debate could be arranged.

Langlie will return Wednesday after testifying before a congressional committee against CVA. His office said the challenge has not been received.

Mitchell is president of the league and a sponsor of the legislation. He will address the state convention of the Veterans of Foreign Wars Thursday in Spokane and will be in the state about two weeks.

Mitchell said he telegraphed Langlie that he "noted with real regret" that the governor's testimony before the committee "was negative."

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
