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Widening Of 6th Viaduct Gets Favor

City councilmen went on record Monday night favoring widening of the No. 6th street viaduct as the number one job necessary for future traffic control.

The question arose when the planning commission presented a list of proposals for council consideration.

The upshot of the discussion with Alfred Collier and Bert Igl, the latter, chairman of the planning commission, was to ascertain from the state highway department what financial arrangements can be made.

Councilmen were not sure whether the job would be done with the city and state splitting the cost or if the state highway would agree to stand the full expense.

Collier felt that the state had grown cold on the matter because of an impression that city officials, the chamber of commerce, and business men were eyeing the westside by-pass, part of the Mahn-Campbell highway survey, as having priority in importance.

City Engineer E. A. Thomas backed this thought when he stated that there had been too much difference of opinion and that "not enough weight has been thrown behind" any one project.

The planning commission presented two other plans to the councilmen as the result of their study of future traffic problems.

Steamer, Fishing Vessel Collide

NANTUCKET, Mass., June 28 (AP)—The Dutch steamer Nieuw Amsterdam and the New Bedford fishing vessel Marmax collided in dense fog 26 miles southeast of Nantucket light vessel early today.

The coast guard reported no one was injured. The fishing craft carried a crew of 12.

The Nieuw Amsterdam, en route to Hoboken, N. J., from Rotterdam, carried 253 passengers. She is owned by the Holland-American line.

The 84-foot fishing craft messaged the N. J. in "no immediate danger." The coast guard said the liner proceeded toward Hoboken after determining the Marmax could keep afloat with pumps. The steamer was due in Hoboken this afternoon.

Bendix Strike Agreement Seen

WASHINGTON, June 28 (AP)—Secretary of Air Eymington announced an agreement today for settlement of the strike that has closed the Bendix Aviation Corporation at South Bend, Ind., for 79 days.

Terms agreed to by the company and United Auto Workers officials were kept secret pending study and a vote by the workers.

Eymington summoned the union and management spokesmen here for conferences which ran through last night and into this morning. He said he did so because of the effect of the stoppage on production of airplane engines.

Symington told reporters "We were in trouble all over the world on these airplane parts." He said that he had used "no coercion whatsoever" in bringing labor and management officials together.
