DiMaggio Blasts Two Homers As Yanks Win

The same old Joe DiMaggio! Three home runs in two days, six runs batted in and a 500 batting average. That's the stuff that made a \$90,000 salary.

Big Joe electrified a giant-sized Tuesday night crowd at Boston with a homer and single in his first league appearance since he limped off that same Boston field last October.

That was only the beginning. Yesterday he hammered two homers, one with two men on base, drove in four runs and personally accounted for the Yanks' 9-7 edge over the Red Sox.

This was the big series for the Sox. Rolling fast at home they had climbed to within five games of the Yanks. A series sweep and they would have been up there knocking on the door. Instead they trail the Yanks by seven games and are back in the second division. Joe D. is the man responsible.

DiMag boosted the Yanks back in the game after Boston clubbed Wild Tommy Byrne from the hill in the four-run first inning. Joe's homer with two men on off Ellis Kinder left the Sox with a 7-4 lead in the fifth.

JOE CLOUDS ONE
After Gene Woodling's double with the bases loaded tied the score in the seventh, DiMaggio hit his game-winning blow off loser Earl Johnson with the bases empty in the eighth.

Cleveland averted disaster with a six-run rally in the last of the ninth inning to down Detroit 8-7 in a night game after they were shut out 4-0 by Hal Newhouse in the twilight opener of a doubleheader.

Bobby Feller let down the sweltering crowd at 8:24 when the Tribe knocked him out in a seven-run fifth inning. But the Tribe bounced back to win for Relievers Steve Gromek when Pinch Hitter Bob Lemon doubled off Dizzy Trout with the bases loaded in the last of the ninth.

Carl Scheib finally got himself untracked, breaking a six-game losing streak with a 7-4 edge for Philadelphia over Washington. The result kept the second place A's 4 1/2 games behind the Yanks.

BROWNS BEAT SOX
Ned Garver edged Walt Pierce in a tight duel as the St. Louis Browns knocked off the Chicago White Sox, 1-0. Dick Kokos' eighth-inning single broke the scoreless tie.

Brooklyn and St. Louis kept in step in the last National league chase as the Dodgers protected their one-game margin by defeating the Phillies, 5-1. The Cards clung to their heels by bouncing Chicago 7-4.

Ralph Branca let down the Phils with five hits to hit the 10-win mark, first to do the trick in the National. Curt Simmons gave up all five Dodger scores before a capacity crowd of 36,814, largest Phil crowd of the year.

Ralph Kiner had a big day for Pittsburgh with a double and a bases loaded home run in their 7-3 romp over Cincinnati. It was Kiner's second grand slam clout of the year, both against the Reds, and the fourth of his big league career.

Larry Jensen elbowed the New York Giants past Boston 9-3 with the help of sloppy infield play by the Braves.

Favorite Pushed

LONDON, June 30 (AP)—Ted Schroeder of La Crescenta, Calif., reached the finals of the Wimbledon tennis championships today by defeating Eric Sturgess of South Africa, 3-6, 7-5, 5-7, 6-1, 6-2, in a bitterly fought match before 17,000 on the center court.

For three sets the South African Davis Cup star played Schroeder, the tournament favorite, on more than even terms. But he tired toward the end and the American star ripped through him in the closing sets.

The victory lifted Schroeder against either John Bromwich of Australia or Jaroslav Drobny of Czechoslovakia in Friday's final, depending upon the winner of today's other semi-final.

Among the capacity crowd that sat and stood in intense heat to watch Schroeder again came from behind to win were the Queen Mother Mary and the Duchess of Kent.

Mrs. Margaret Osborne Dupont of Bellevue, Del., the American women's singles champion, advanced to the semi-finals with a one-sided victory over Mrs. Betty Hilton, one of Britain's top players, 6-1, 6-3.

Waitkus Faces Assault

CHICAGO, June 30 (AP)—Eddie Waitkus, Philadelphia first baseman, went to the criminal court in a wheelchair today to confront the girl admirer who shot him with a rifle June 15.

His assailant, 19-year-old Ruth Stenhausen, was held to the grand jury on a charge of assault to commit murder. Judge Matthew D. Hartigan set her bond at \$50,000.

State's Attorney John S. Boyle opened the arraignment with a statement that Waitkus had to be back in the Illinois Masonic hospital in 45 minutes.

It was the first time Waitkus had left the hospital since Miss Stenhausen shot the Phillies' star after luring him to her hotel room.

PHILADELPHIA, June 30 (AP)—Luis Olmo, Brooklyn outfielder, recently reinstated after jumping to the Mexican league three years ago, rejoined the Dodgers' lineup last night—only to sustain a foot injury that may keep him inactive for a week.

Olmo sprained a tendon in his left foot sliding into second as Brooklyn defeated the Philadelphia Phillies 3-1.

Olmo started in left field for the Dodgers when Tommy Brown reported the nail on his left thumb—torn last Sunday—was not healed sufficiently.

In his seven inning of action last night, Olmo got on base on walks twice in three trips to the plate. He was replaced in the seventh by Myron McCormick.
