## Excise Tax Slash Eyed

WASHINGTON, June 30 (AP)—Rep. Martin (Mass.), house republican leader, moved today for a quick vote on legislation reducing some wartime excise taxes.

The taxes are on such things as furs, silver, luggage, cosmetics, transportation and communications.

Martin said a petition is being signed to discharge the house ways and means committee from any further consideration of the measure.

If 218 house members—a majority—sign it, the bill would come to a house vote immediately. It would slash some taxes more than 50 per cent.

The measure would cut federal taxes by about \$600,000,000 a year, some congressmen estimate. It would not reduce the war-imposed extra rates on liquor, that now yield about \$600,000,000 annually. There would be no reduction in tobacco excises.

## Governor Swears In "Governor"

CORVALLIS, June 30 (AP)—Governor McKay was on hand here last night to "inaugurate" another governor—Ralph Thayer, Portland, of the Beaver Boys State.

Thayer was elected to the top position in the annual session sponsored here by the American Legion to teach boys the workings of government.

Others elected: Bob Glass, Eugene, secretary of state; Gordon Links, Madras, treasurer; Richard Wilbanks, Albany, attorney general; Lloyd Dyer, Medford, labor commissioner; Don Crawford, Eugene; Robert Schmidt, Eugene; and James Butler, Portland, supreme court justice.

## Fast Time Champs Need Signatures

PORTLAND, June 30 (AP)—The backers of Daylight Saving Time have about 7000 signatures to go—if they want to keep fast time here this summer.

The sponsors of petitions calling for a referendum on the issue reported that 9000 valid signatures already have been checked. The petitions must be completed by July 15 to keep a state law banning Daylight Saving Time from going into effect.

## Diomedes To Take Over Greek Chair

ATHENS, Greece, June 30 (AP)—Alexander Diomedes, former finance minister and governor of the national bank will be sworn in tonight as head of a new Greek coalition government. He is a liberal party leader.

Diomedes, 74 and a banker, said there would be no changes in the composition of the coalition government as it existed when liberal Premier Themistokles Sophoulis died last Friday.

His acceptance of King Paul's invitation to lead the nation, followed six days of futile effort by Constantinos Tsaldaris, populist (royalist) party leader, to form a 100 per cent royalist cabinet.

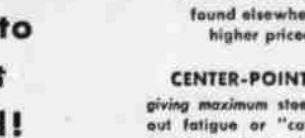

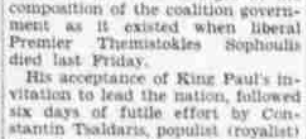

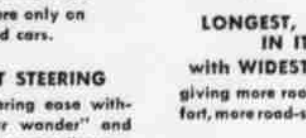
