Stocks Stage Slow Advance

NEW YORK, June 30 (AP)—A heavy-footed stock market slowly advanced today.

Gains ranged from fractions to around a point. Not enough buying power developed to stir the price level any more of a lift.

Trading interest was no more than apathetic. Turnover was at the rate of only 600,000 shares or so for the full session.

News of the department of justice anti-trust suit against DuPont, General Motors, U. S. Rubber and others failed to make a dent on the market, even on stocks of companies directly affected.

Most observers felt that tangible results of the suit, if any, would not be apparent for a long time.

Higher prices were paid for Bethlehem Steel, General Motors, Chrysler, Woolworth, American Telephone, General Electric, Dow Chemical, American Tobacco, Southern Pacific, Standard Oil (N.J.), Richfield Oil, and Twentieth Century-Fox.

Trimmed a bit were U. S. Steel, U. S. Rubber, Montgomery Ward.

SELLING KILLS GRAIN GAINS

CHICAGO, June 30 (AP)—Selling late in the day either completely wiped out or greatly reduced gains made in early dealings on the board of trade today. The selling followed news rains had been received in parts of the spring wheat and rye belts.

Rye tumbled sharply, dropping more than 4 cents under the previous close at times. This is a thin market and a little increase in either buying or selling will cause wide price swings, traders said.

Until late in the day, the market had turned in a firm performance under the leadership of wheat. The bread cereal was aided by an early advance in cash prices and by overnight announcement of an unchanged parity level.

Wheat closed 1/4-1/2 lower, July 11.95%-1.2%, was 1/4 lower to 1/2 higher, July 11.34%-1.5%, oats were 1/2 lower to 1/4 higher, July 10.6%-1.2%, rye was 2 1/4-4 1/2 lower, July 11.35%-1.36%, soybeans were unchanged to 1/2 higher, July 22.34%-1.5%, and lard was 10 cents lower to 5 cents a hundred pounds higher, July 110.50.

The British military government sent a transport official to the Berlin boundary checkpoint to investigate the new snarl in the city's commerce today.

The British announced the Russians had seized eleven trucks at the checkpoint late yesterday, escorted them to a military headquarters in the Berlin suburb, Pan-Kow, and unloaded the cargoes, mostly perishable fruits, vegetables and fish.

The Russians then released the drivers and their empty vehicles, giving them receipts for the detained loads.

Foreign Trade Zones Get Okay. WASHINGTON, June 30 (AP)—Establishment of foreign trade zones at Los Angeles and Seattle has been authorized, Secretary of Commerce Sawyer announced today.

This will bring the number of these "free port" merchandising areas to five. The three others are at New York, New Orleans and San Francisco.

Foreign-trade zones are segregated port areas where importers may deposit foreign merchandise for storing or processing without payment of customs duties, unless the merchandise later is moved into the U. S. proper.

BUDGET

EUGENE, June 30 (AP)—The Lane county operating budget for the year 1949-50 totaling \$2,835,171.97 was officially adopted Wednesday and will become effective July 1.

The total tax levy will be within the constitutional six per cent limitation. Taxes within the six per cent will amount to \$721,120. Together with the two and one-half mill levy for the market road construction and the one and one-half mill for the county wide garbage disposal system, both outside the limitation by vote of the people, total taxes to balance the budget will to an estimated \$1,046,620.
