

Disaster Unit Agencies Asked

PORTLAND, June 30 (AP)—Establishment of disaster agencies in each Western state was urged Wednesday by Idaho's Attorney General Robert E. Smylie.

In an address to the Western states safety council, Smylie said he estimated such an agency could be created in Idaho for \$5000 a year.

Smylie said a civil defense statute suggested by the office of defense planning was unnecessarily complex and unnecessarily burdened with administrative overhead.

He said in the past 20 months a disaster organization could have been used in Idaho four times—during the North Idaho floods last spring and summer; during the communication, transportation and supply breakdown last winter because of abundant snowfall; the butane gas explosion at Nampa in November, 1947, and "in providing a means of coordinating the far-flung activities which we in Idaho undertake to guard our magnificent forests and scenic resources."

Smylie said damage from the Northern Idaho floods last year could have been reduced if the state had "an adequate statutory basis for coordination and planning."

Fish Packers Ask Lower Prices

ASTORIA, Ore., June 30 (AP)—Columbia river fish packers are proposing an 18-cent-a-pound price for salmon caught in July.

The price, substantially lower than last year, is being voted upon this week by Columbia river fishermen, who received 20 cents for spring-caught salmon.

The packers also are proposing a 18-cent price for salmon caught after July.

The spring season closed in mid-June. Commercial fishing will resume July 6.

Packers blamed a dull market for the proposed price cuts.

Colombia Clamps Down On Bandits

BOGOTA, Colombia, June 30 (AP)—The government warned Wednesday it is prepared to crush "banditry" as reports of new "political" killings reached here from the interior. News dispatches said 16 persons were slain Monday alone.

The current clashes mark the latest round in the old feud between the liberal and conservative parties. The two groups have been warring for years. Each party usually blames the other for starting the row.

The liberals, who lost part of their majority in the chamber of representatives in a nationwide election early this month have declared opposition to all administrative actions of the government. The conservatives, under President Mariano Ospina Perez, control the government's executive branch.
