

CAB Plots Change For West Coast

WASHINGTON, June 30 (AP)—The Civil Aeronautics Board suggested today that West Coast Airlines, a feeder carrier which flies between Medford, Ore., and Bellingham, Wash., should eliminate some points on its route and add others to improve its "revenue-cost ratio."

The proposal accompanied an announcement of the board's intention to extend the line's temporary operating certificate five years. A public hearing will be held and arguments heard before any decision is made, however, a spokesman said. No hearing date was set.

The board said it would also decide whether United Air Lines or West Coast should serve Bellingham. There is no need for the present service by both lines, the board commented. It also suggested that it might require United to suspend service at Salem, Ore., and add that city to West Coast's route.

Points which it may be advisable to drop, a spokesman said, are McMinnville, Roseburg and Grants Pass, Ore., and Port Townsend and Kelso, Wash. Only McMinnville is now served as the other cities lack adequate airport facilities. McMinnville has developed too little traffic to justify service, the board said.

Hickenlooper Winds Up Case

WASHINGTON, June 30 (AP)—Senator Hickenlooper (R-Iowa) today ended the first phase of his case against the atomic energy commission which he has charged with "incalculable mismanagement."

Hickenlooper announced to the joint senate-house atomic committee, which has been hearing the charges, that he feels he can proceed no further publicly until the committee has acted in closed session upon some other aspects of his case.

He referred to his charges of commission laxity in security matters, case against the atomic energy commission which he has charged with "incalculable mismanagement."

In the meantime, the commission will present what Chairman David E. Lilienthal called an "accounting of our stewardship" beginning next Wednesday.

"We will make this succinct, brief and yet comprehensive as possible," Lilienthal said. "It should not take many days."

Government Closes Pool

WASHINGTON, June 30 (AP)—A government swimming pool which became the scene of disturbances when opened to both white and Negro youths has been closed.

Secretary Krug of the interior department, which operates the pool, ordered it closed until further notice. He acted after the mixed swimming led to a pool-side melee for a second straight day yesterday.

Park police said hundreds were involved in the pushing and punching outside the Anacostia pool in Southeast Washington. At least four youths were injured, one a girl trampled by a mounted policeman's horse. There were five arrests.

The interior department's order of a no-segregation policy at its four pools caused a rift with the District of Columbia recreation board, which insisted that segregation be continued. Negroes have begun swimming at only one other pool, McKinley, but there has been no trouble there.

Lumber Kiln To Be Finished Soon

ELGIN, June 30 (AP)—A \$30,000 lumber kiln will be completed by August 1, F. E. Calder, president of the new Elgin Pine Lumber, Inc., reported Wednesday. It will be a central feature of the

plant, which will incorporate a planing mill operated here by Calder since 1946.

The kiln will have a weekly capacity of 30,000 feet of shop or select lumber and 105,000 feet of common grade, he said. A number of improvements are planned at the planing mill, he said.

Prisoner Tries To Take Own Life

TACOMA, June 30 (AP)—Lawrence J. Sharp, 20-year-old Vancouver youth who is charged with dynamiting his home, attempted to commit suicide in his cell here last night, Del. Lieut. Don Hager said this morning.

Sharp used a discarded razor blade to slash his wrist, Hager said. His plight was noticed by several other prisoners who called for help. Five surgical stitches were taken at the Pierce county hospital to close the wound.

Hospital attendants said the wound was not serious and that Sharp had been returned to the city jail cell where he is held for federal authorities.

Hager said the slashing occurred shortly after 6 p. m. The youth is awaiting trial on a charge of having dynamited the home of his parents in McLoughlin Heights, Vancouver. He was a University of Washington student when the dynamiting took place in May.

PORTLAND, June 30 (AP)—August 5 has been set as the deadline for submitting bids on a 60,000,000-gallon capacity sewage treatment plant at Portland. It will be a major part of the city's \$12,000,000 sewage disposal system.

Commissioner William A. Boves filed plans and specifications for the plant with the city purchasing agent today.

Chinese Reds Seek Higher Production

NANKING, June 30 (AP)—Communist leader Mao Tse-tung broadcast from Peiping today a message to Chinese workers telling them they must cooperate with capitalists so that maximum production can be attained.

Mao urged communist party members to continue their close cooperation with labor. He said failure of Sun Yat-sen's policies and those of the Kuomintang was due to their neglect of the proletariat. The red leader declared in a

statement commemorating the 28th anniversary of the Chinese communist party that success of the party resulted solely from its close alliance with the peasants and laboring masses.

But he warned that the party's present labor policy called for unrestricted license but rather for control and cooperation with capital.

Overcast Keeps Bombers Down

SHANGHAI, June 30 (AP)—An overcast and rain today kept bi-national bombers from returning to Shanghai where yesterday they killed 82 persons and injured more than 100.

Four-engine bombers, never more than two at a time, ranged leisurely over the city at low altitude yesterday seeking targets. Most

of their bombs fell in the crowded native section of chapel. It was the most daring raid yet on the red-captured city.

Almost negligible resistance was put up by the communists. No anti-aircraft guns went into action. The bombers dropped down to around 1,500 feet to get below the overcast. They were just out of machinegun range—the only weapons used against them.
