A SEATTLE man by the name of Schmoes has felt an obligation ever since the Hiroshima bombing to build a house for someone in Japan. So, some time ago, he started taking up a collection, chipping in himself, with his own money, as he went along.

He raised \$4000, and a couple of weeks hence he will sail for Hiroshima to begin his building job. (The house, by the way, will be a child care clinic.)

QUIXOTIC?  
Well, let's look at it this way. Suppose his act impressed all the Japanese who heard of it. Suppose other Americans did something somewhat similar. Suppose, out of all of it, came a feeling of friendliness toward America on the part of the defeated Japs.

Suppose, as a result of this feeling of friendliness, Japan and America remained at peace henceforth. In that event, it WOULDNT BE SO QUIXOTIC, would it?

THERE is historical precedent along that line. Some 20 centuries ago, Julius Caesar whipped the Gauls completely. When he finished the job, he knew the Gauls were whipped and THEY knew they were whipped.

HE THEN DEALT WITH THEM SO FAIRLY THAT FOR MORE THAN 200 YEARS THERE WAS NO WAR BETWEEN ROME AND GAUL. Common decency and fairness and good will OFTEN pay off.

WE hear a lot about guaranteed security in these days. Famous Lloyd's of London proposes to take a whiff at it on a free enterprise basis.

If you're scared of infantile paralysis, smallpox or typhoid, and if you live in the United Kingdom, Lloyd's will sell you for \$4 a policy that, if you are stricken with any of those dread diseases, will pay you \$40 a week until you have collected a total of \$4000.

THEY call it the "1000-to-1 insurance against epidemics." The odds, you see, are pretty good. Even as a gambling proposition, it beats slot machines or playing the horses.

THE point is that security (if that is what you want above everything else) DOESNT HAVE TO COME FROM THE POLITICIANS. Here in this country, you can buy from a responsible insurance company a policy that at a certain age will let you retire with enough money to live on for the rest of your life. If you start YOUNG ENOUGH, the premiums won't be prohibitive.

IF, as a survey of college graduates recently conducted by Fortune Magazine strongly indicates, security is what the present generation wants more than anything, we ought to get rid of the idea that ONLY POLITICIANS can provide security.

That isn't true. If security in old age is what you want, you can buy security from responsible concerns that are managed by business people instead of politicians.

Maybe you'd rather have the kind of security the politicians promise. If so, that's your business. This is a free country. Your right to CHOOSE WHAT YOU WANT was bought and paid for with the blood and the treasure of your liberty-loving ancestors. But at least it will do you no harm to realize that security is available to you without political help.

### Prison Term Decreed For Russian Spy

WASHINGTON, July 1 (AP)—Judith Coplan today was sentenced to 40 months to 10 years in prison for spying for Russia.

The tiny brunette former justice department worker heard the sentence unflinchingly.

A short time before hearing her penalty, she made an impassioned statement to Federal Judge Albert L. Reeves, but she did not ask for mercy.

Actually, Judge Reeves passed two sentences—40 months to 10 years on the first (spying) count of the indictment against her, and one to three years on the second (theft of secrets) count.

He stipulated, however, that the sentences be served concurrently.

Just before passing sentence, Judge Reeves said: "I thoroughly approve of the verdict of the jury."

New Bond  
Judge Reeves ordered Miss Coplan to post a new bond of \$20,000.

Her old bond here—\$10,000—automatically expired with the passing of sentence.

She also is under \$20,000 bond in an espionage conspiracy case in New York.

Under today's sentence, Miss Coplan would be eligible to apply for parole in 40 months should she lose the appeal her attorney announced would be made.

Judge Reeves recommended that the sentence be served in the Women's Reformatory at Alderson, W. Va.

He explained, however, that this is a mere recommendation and that the prison will be selected by the justice department if Miss Coplan actually serves the time.

Judge Reeves rejected a demand by Prosecutor John M. Kelley Jr., that Miss Coplan be held in jail of \$100,000.
