

Franey Back, But Prisoner Still In East

Sheriff Jack Franey returned from Indianapolis Thursday, but without the prisoner he went for.

The sheriff went back to Indiana to take into custody an army private, Lewis E. Murphy, named in a secret indictment here charging larceny by impersonation. Murphy allegedly signed the name of a construction company paymaster to some \$500 worth of checks in Klamath county.

At the time he was AWOL from Fort Benjamin Harrison, Ind. He later was picked up by the army and taken to the brig at Fort Benjamin Harrison, where he supposedly was to be held for release to Klamath county.

Extradition papers were okayed here and Franey went back to Indianapolis to attend an extradition hearing there. After the army private was ordered turned over to Franey, it developed Murphy wasn't around anywhere.

He had been released from the brig and transferred to Camp Attenuary, Ind., for duty, had gotten an emergency furlough and decamped.

The army, Franey said, was unable to produce the man it had promised would be "available at all times."

Franey is now dicker with the army to bring Murphy out to Oregon in military custody, if and when he is located.

Priest Arrested For Running 'Gambling Game'

ROCKFORD, Ill., July 1 (AP)—The Rev. Raymond Patrick Gordon, a Roman Catholic priest, was arrested last night after 12 policemen raided his church to halt a bingo game.

The priest, pastor of St. Bridget's church in suburban Love's Park, was charged with being a keeper of a gambling establishment. He was released on his recognizance after appearing before a justice of the peace.

Police Chief Roy York of Love's Park led the raid and said several pieces of gambling equipment were seized in the church's basement. He said Andrew Pozzi and two other unidentified men were arrested on a charge of operating a gambling establishment. They were released on bonds of \$120 each after appearing before a justice of the peace.

Some 50 patrons were at the church, York said, but were not taken into custody.

Tuna Boats Back At Sea Again

SAN PEDRO, Calif., July 1 (AP)—The tuna boats will take to the high seas again next week after a two-month strike-enforced lull.

The CIO fishermen's union reached an agreement with San Pedro canneries yesterday, similar to the AFL fishermen's union deal in San Diego last Tuesday. The union accepted a dockside price of \$310 a ton, \$30 less than when the dispute began but more than canneries had offered to pay after a recent retail slump.

Yangtze Threatened By Floodwaters

NANKING, July 1 (AP)—The lower Yangtze valley today was threatened by rising floodwaters.

River dikes here and at Pukow across the Yangtze are near submergence. Emergency steps are being taken to meet the flood threat.

Four of 12 wharves on the river front have been inundated. Streets around the railway station have been submerged.

An estimated 1000 refugees have been flooded out.

Dispatches from upriver say the situation is most critical in the provinces of Anhwei and Kiangsi.

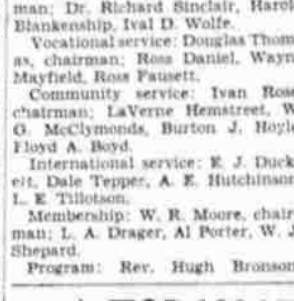

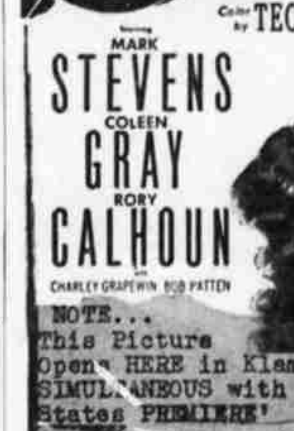
