Park Damage Reward Fund To Be Posted

The city park-recreation committee is taking a firm stand against vandalism on city parks and playgrounds and has offered a \$50 reward for the arrest and conviction of people caught destroying or defacing park property.

City Recreation Director Sam Smith said that already five windows have been broken in the recently constructed equipment shed and rest rooms at Ewauna park on High street. Motor scooters being driven across the grounds of Stukel park near Mills school are tearing up the grass and knocking off sprinkler heads in the watering system.

The park-recreation park asks that people treat the parks and playgrounds with regard because for the first time Klamath is building up a system of summer recreation areas which provide places for youngsters to play, and which can be used and improved for many summers if they are taken care of now.

Building Gets Big Boost

An unusually anemic half year of city building was given a shot in arm by the construction of the new gym and parish hall at Sacred Heart academy, a \$141,000 job.

The total building figure for the first six months of this year in Klamath Falls is \$345,142.

Only 219 permits were granted during the six months. High in number of construction jobs was March with 54. A cord January brought in only seven permits.

The job at Sacred Heart boosted the June figure to \$169,142, almost half the total for the first six months, January through June.

Only seven applications for new homes were issued during the six months, totaling \$87,000.

Big commercial job was construction of the new Texaco service station, Wall and Esplanade, costing \$17,000.

Walter Salsbery, building inspector, said that this year was unusually inactive in the building field. "Last year we hit in the neighborhood of \$1,500,000 and we'll be lucky if it hits the three-quarter million mark this year," Salsbery said.

OTI Swimming Schedule Revised Due To Crowds

Necessary revisions in the swimming instruction schedule at the Oregon Technical Institute pool have been announced by the city recreation office.

Changes were made necessary by the unexpectedly large number of children who turned out for swimming lessons. Regular hours for public swimming are from 1 to 10 p. m., seven days a week. Instruction and open swimming can be accommodated at the same time in the big pool because of its size.

City Recreation Director Sam Smith announced today that all recreation activities except open swimming will be closed at noon Saturday, and reopen Tuesday, July 5. The OTI pool, however, will be open for public swimming the regular hours. There will be no swimming instruction.

Ackerman Asked To Serve On Post

Police Judge Leith Ackerman has been asked by Eugene Police Chief Keith L. Jones to serve on the governor's state committee on children and youth, on which Jones serves as chairman.

The committee was set up to study juvenile problems and methods of handling delinquents by the police departments.

Ackerman indicated he would accept the post.

Parking Curbs Granted Okay

Parking controls in the vicinity of the Suburban fire department in the S. 6th and Gettle street area have been approved by the state highway commission.

As soon as proper signs are erected, enforcement will begin. This plan will require parallel parking on Oregon 66 in the vicinity of Gettle, and will prohibit any parking on the south side of Oregon 66 in that area. (Oregon 66 is S. 6th.)

The county court will be asked to prohibit all parking on the east side of Gettle between 6th and Crosby, and to prohibit parking on the west side in front of the fire station.

The fire department officials asked that the action be taken to facilitate movement of emergency equipment.

Divorce Law Report Puts Priest Out

PORTLAND, July 1 (AP)—The resignation of a Catholic priest from a prominent civic club because of its recently adopted divorce report was disclosed today.

The very Rev. Thomas J. Tobin, vicar-general of the archdiocese, resigned from the City club in a protest of a report he called "a violation of fundamental human rights."

The report, drafted after months of study by business and professional men in the organization, suggested changes in divorce laws, marital counseling, and a possible "family court."

"They proposed to say whether people should marry," said Father Tobin. "This is a fundamental privilege of the individual and the state has no right to take it away from him."

One bit of the long report sets forth as a general principle the premise that the welfare of the community should have precedence over the desires of people who wish to make or break a marriage contract.

NO ALARM
PORTLAND, July 1 (AP)—A ringing burglar alarm didn't seem to bother a prowler at the home of Dr. Ruth Barnett. Police said the alarm was tripped when a rear window was broken, but the prowler went on in and made a systematic search of the house.

Nothing was taken. Detectives said the would-be burglar apparently was looking only for money.
