Cracker Use Limited

It's all right to buy fireworks, there's no law against it, and the Fourth of July is the appropriate season for it.

It is against the law, however, to fire off firecrackers—almost everywhere you can think of doing it, that is.

Federal regulations regarding firecrackers are the same as those governing camp fires and smoking on forest land. You can't throw fire-

crackers, or other inflammable material from any private road or public highway within the state either, and stay within the law. Supposing you take your fireworks up to Lake o' the Woods and shoot them off, you are making yourself liable to \$500 fine or 12 months in jail or both! Same if you shoot them on any other U. S. forest service land, national park or otherwise.

So, buy them if you like and carry them with you—there's no law we've found against that!

California Top On Road Cost List

WASHINGTON, July 2 (AP)—More than one-tenth of the cost of the proposed \$11,266,371,816 express highway system would be in California, a detailed report of the public roads administration showed Friday.

The greatest mileage of construction—3764 miles—would be in Texas. But because of lower construction and land-acquisition costs there, that state would rank seventh in the overall expenditure.

President Truman recommended the agency's 37,000-mile program, called "highway needs of the national defense," to congress yesterday. It calls for a seven-fold increase in the current construction rate and completion of the system within 20 years.

The agency said completion of the program—involving relocations and improvements of present roads and building of bridges and tunnels as well as new highway construction—would provide the nation with an adequate highway system linking all major cities, production centers and defense areas.

A state-by-state summary of the system, first of its kind to be compiled listing rural and urban miles and costs, includes:

Idaho—rural, 608.2 miles, \$46,773,000; urban, 8.7 miles, \$3,470,000.

Oregon—rural, 675.2 miles, \$94,450,000; urban, 27.8 miles, \$23,465,000.

Washington—rural, 521 miles, \$118,363,500; urban, 58.5 miles, \$66,096,000.

Ford-Union Agree On Talk Terms

DETROIT, July 2 (AP)—Any likelihood of a mid-July Ford strike thinned out today.

Ford and the CIO United Auto Workers, at loggerheads over \$100-a-month pensions and a wage increase, agreed to extend their contract on a day-to-day basis.

The pact, covering 106,000 workers, expires July 15. The agreement provides for its indefinite continuance beyond that date.

Judith Coplon Waits Trial In New York

WASHINGTON, July 2 (AP)—Judith Coplon, already under one sentence as a spy for Russia, now must wait the start of a second espionage trial.

The former justice department worker is scheduled to go on trial in New York July 11 along with Valentine A. Gubitchev, a Russian she said she loved. That trial could add up to 35 years to the sentence of 40 months to 10 years she has already gotten.

Still defiant and protesting her innocence despite a jury's verdict and a judge's opinion to the contrary, the tiny, 28-year-old brunette returned to her native New York last night. She planned to spend the time until her next trial at her mother's home in Brooklyn.

With the trial finally over, Attorney General Clark issued a statement saying he had had no "quarrel" and no "feud" with FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover and that there has been no "resignation" by Hoover.

Den Mother's Awards Go To KF Mothers

Death Asked For Strangler

ROANOKE, Va., July 2 (AP)—The state today asked a jury to send Lee Scott to the electric chair for the strangulation of his high-school classmate, Dana Marie Weaver.

Assistant Prosecutor Beverly L. Fitzpatrick made the demand as final arguments in the trial began in Hustings court.

Fitzpatrick said the husky, 16-year-old high school wrestler choked Dana Marie to death to silence her.

This, he said, was an attempt by Scott to protect his proud reputation as a youth leader after the girl spurned his immoral advances in the kitchen of a Christ Episcopal church the night of May 8.

Fitzpatrick ridiculed the defense story that Scott suffered a "mental blackout."
