

Chest Directors Vote For \$65,540 Budget Against \$80,000 Agencies Asked

Community Chest directors last night voted a budget of \$65,540 for the fall campaign objective.

The figure finally agreed upon was a compromise between \$80,000 asked on toto by the participating agencies, and \$57,000 recommended by the budget committee.

In general, it will give the local agencies exactly what they were budgeted for last year. Two new agencies, the Chiloquin and Merrill Teen-Age clubs, are in this year's program.

It was brought out in the meeting that the campaign this year will be carried on mainly under the leadership of the agencies, and too drastic cuts would have a tendency to destroy the campaign spirit.

Representatives of at least one agency, the Boy Scouts, said that the budget allocation as originally proposed would cause a disintegration of the Scout program.

A. M. Collier made the motion that the recommended budgets for local agencies which had been cut be boosted 20 per cent across the board. The motion carried with only one board member dissenting.

Chet Hamaker was announced as the campaign chairman for this year. Hamaker said he had accepted the appointment on condition that all agencies accept budget allocations in good spirit and agree to make a vigorous campaign. He said he will call a meeting of agency representatives soon.

At the close of the session there was general agreement that a fair compromise had been reached.

Malcolm Epley, Chest president, said:

"Our board has gone into this thing as representative of the public and of the agencies. We have tried to provide a living allocation for the agencies, feeling that the public will want to contribute to a financial set-up that will permit the agencies to work effectively. At the same time, we realize that the community's potential is limited, and we do not want to set goals that we know realistically cannot be reached. We believe we have reached a sensible point that will realize both objectives—a goal we can make and one that will provide the agencies with decent financial support."
